Tentative Offers Surface to Aid In Restoration of Fraternal Temple

Last Thursday morning your reporter received a long-awaited answer to a letter he had written to the Master of Kendrick Grange back in December of 1994, one in which he sought possible assistance from the Architecture Department of the U. of I. in restoring Kendrick's Fraternal Temple Building.

That same morning Dana Magnuson, President of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association, spent an hour with a representative of the Idaho Heritage Trust in touring the Fraternal Temple building, inside and out.

The visit from the Heritage Trust site evaluator was the result of an invitation that had been extended earlier by the Development Association's Phyllis Berg, who has been very active in promoting the restoration of historic buildings in the larger community of Kendrick-Juliaetta. Local Grain Warehouse Offices Hit by Burglars

The offices of two local grain warehouses were burglarized late Thursday evening or early Friday morning. The thieves broke windows at Columbia Grain Co. and a glass door at Lewiston Grain Growers to gain entrance to the offices where office supplies and small tools were taken.

Brady O'Kelly of Columbia Grain said items such as a first aid kit, a case of toilet tissue, a box of latex gloves, light bulbs, a bucket of miscellaneous tools (valued at approximately \$100), and dust respirators were missing. Two windows were broken.

The thieves also broke the glass from a door at Lewiston Grain Growers and again took only petty cash, some computer equipment and broke the dial off the office safe, and generally vandalized the room.

The break-ins were investigated by deputies from the Latah County sheriff's department.

I's Associate Professor of Architecture Wendy McClure explained how the Grange's letter had fallen between the cracks back in mid-January of 1995 when she had suffered a

sking accident. And her letter outlined the possibility of involving architecture students in helping community representatives plan for the restoration of the Temple building.

Your reporter, who had long ago given up receiving a reply to his letter of 1994, only last month once again heard Professor McClure mentioned as a person who was providing assistance in the restoration of historic buildings throughout the state of Idaho. Why not, he thought, give her another try. At least he'd learn whether she ever received his first letter.

Yes, she had, and now she was answering in a tentative and yet positive way. She writes that she and her students, "can perhaps help with some initial brainstorming of how the building might be adapted for other uses." Her proposal is to bring the students to Kendrick either during the fall or winter semester for what is technically called a design charrette (French for cart). This concept would involve an evening or Saturday of her students working with local citizens or Grange members in teams to brainstorm about possible uses and design layouts for the building.

To do this, she continues, someone here would need to organize the community participants, provide a place to hold the workshop (and support student and faculty travel and workshop materials. "If this idea has support in the community," she writes, "contact me and I will schedule it for the fall or winter semester."

A copy of her letter has been furnished Bob Hassoldt, Grange Master, and Dana Magnuson, President of the K-JCDA. In your reporter's view, the leadership for such a project must come from one organization or the other—or possibly from a coalition of the two—and be backed by the community at large. Readers are encouraged to consider whether they would support such a project.

Meanwhile the Heritage Trust technical advisor feels that the Fraternal Temple building is structurally sound but obviously in need of restoration. And a good prospect for a Heritage Trust grant. Grants generally do not exceed \$10,000 and do require a 50% cash match. The Trust is also willing to consider the possibility of a series of grants over time for a project requiring a considerable sum of money. Again, leadership to pursue this possibility must originate within the community and be supported by it. We look for that leadership to emerge.
