Grants generally do not exceed \$10,000 and lo require a 50% cash match. The Trust is also willing to consider the possibility of a series of grants over time for a project requiring a considerable sum of money. Again, leadership to pursue this possibility must originate within the community and be supported by it. We look for that leadership to emerge.




