Kendrick Receives 1998 Arts Grant

The Idaho Commission on the Arts announced its 1998 arts grant last week at a series of press conferences throughout the state and among these was a grant of \$526 to the Kendrick-Juliaetta Arts Council for some local arts programming through one-time funding from the Idaho State Legislature. A total of \$472,333 was granted for 167 projects in 45 towns. All funds are matched by local communities.

"The arts are thriving in Idaho," Governor Phillip E. Batt explained. "This year's grants, awarded to Gem State artists, arts organizations, and schools, will provide new opportunities for Idahoans. People throughout our state, working in the arts, bring creativity and economic rewards to our communities, and they enrich the lives of our children. We are proud to be partners with them."

Idaho Commission of the Arts Chair, Delores C. Fery, said, "We are deeply appreciative to the Governor and the Legislature for their support. These awards reflect a commitment by lawmakers to the arts through the appropriation of one-time money to local arts councils. These organizations make the arts available in our communities around the state."

The Idaho Commission on the Arts made its funding decisions at the June 19-21 meeting in Boise. The Commission is a state agency dedicated to making the arts available to all citizens in Idaho. The Commission is governed by thirteen private citizens who are appointed by the Governor to serve four-year terms. The Commission prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability or age.

Jack W. Smith, a former Big Bear Ridge resident, died Monday, July 21, at his home in Lewiston of cancer. He was 71.

He was born January 26, 1926, to John Walton and Anna Hohman Smith at Seattle. He graduated from Vancouver (Wash.) High School in 1946.

He became an apprentice boiler-maker at 14 and remained a boiler-maker all his life.

He served with the U. S. Navy from June 23, 1944, to June 5, 1946, in Guam and the Saipan Islands.

He married Mary Aleock October 14, 1947, at Vancouver. The couple made their home in the Vancouver-Portland, Oregon area and he worked as a superintendent for Bacoek and Wilcox Construction Co. His work took him as far north as Alaska and as far south as Mexico and many states in between.

The couple divorced in 1975. He married Louella Forest Oct. 19, 1976, at Reno, Nev. They moved to the Lewiston and Kendrick area.

He enjoyed airplanes and liked to pilot his own airplane to various places.

He restored antique automobiles and his pride and joy was a Samson truck that he restored and drove in many parades. He also participated in amateur boxing in his younger years.

He is survived by his wife at the couple's Lewiston home; a daughter, Janet Smith of Portland; a stepson, Dale Fry of Lewiston; a stepdaughter, Nori Pearson of Smyrna, Tenn.; two brothers, Gary Smith of Los Banos, Calif., and Ross Smith of Vancouver; and four step-grandchildren.

A memorial service was held July 26 at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston. Cremation followed.

**Responding to Illness—
Parents May Influence
Children's Health Behavior**

What do you do when you have a bad cold—stay home from work, see your doctor and take a few aspirin? Or do you just tough it out?

How you respond to illness may depend on a variety of factors. Yet research indicates your parents may have played a significant role in shaping your perception and reaction to illness—behaviors you can in turn pass along to your children. "Parents tend to reinforce and model behaviors for their children, and those behaviors may include dealing with illness," explains Dr. Rona Levy, professor at the University of Washington School of Social Work.

Levy, who has conducted research into illness behaviors, explains that a person's being labeled ill results from a combination of two factors. The first is physical—such as a fev-

er, sore throat or other problems indicated in medical tests. The second factor is referred to as "illness behavior." This is exhibited through the following processes—perception and thoughts of feeling ill, verbally describing an illness to others, altering daily activities and seeking medical treatment.

"A parent may have a role in determining illness behavior," Levy says. "Some people may remember their mother letting them stay home from school or receiving a lot of attention when they weren't feeling well. Others may have been treated differently."

Levy notes that actions or behaviors reinforced by parents often increase in frequency. Related to this finding, initial research indicates that a child who receives greater attention for a certain type of illness behavior may be more inclined to suffer from such complaints as an adult. Additionally, parents and children may follow similar patterns when it comes to using health services, one form of illness behavior.

"We don't know the specifics about which actions may influence children, but there is good indication there are connections between generations," she says.

"I'm not saying parents should always ignore their children's illness complaints—they should be aware that kids watch what they do and often imitate it. It's true for many activities, and it's also true for illness."
