Regarding Mr. Meyer's letter to the editor in last week's Gazette, I fail to see the connection between the park and dust control. Maybe he is under the mistaken impression that the City of Juliaetta has financed the Juliaetta Centennial Park. The Juliaetta Centennial Park Project Committee, Inc. was formed by people who had served on the Juliaetta Centennial held in 1992. With profits of just over \$5,000 raised from the sale of T-shirts, calendars and cookbooks, this group of 14 people banded together with the intent of buying land and building a baseball field and park to be DONATED to the City of Juliaetta because the City could not afford to build one itself. The Park Committee has no regular source of funding, any and all money that has been spent on the ballfield and park has come from private donations, Federal and State grants, the J-K Recreation District and private foundation grants. Each and every dollar received was for a specified project.

Upon formation of the Park Committee, which by the way was publicly announced and open to all, a list of projects to be included was prioritized and voted on. The number one priority was a baseball field to serve the youth of our community. Other priorities included a covered pavilion, a playground, restrooms, a volleyball pit and a horseshoe pit. We held many workdays, always announced in advance and asking for help. On the average, 12 people showed up. The people who came to help were always greatly appreciated. As one might reasonably expect, with an average of only 12 people doing all the work and no regular source of funding, the progress on a project this big may not be as fast as some would like. The Committee has also had to deal with the flood of 1996 that destroyed 3 years of work. Instead of giving up, these 14 people donated more of their time and with the help of some other generous people, rebuilt what

## Rural Partners Scheduled to Discuss Welfare-to-Work Issues at LCSC Sept. 8

Gem Community representatives from North Central Idaho counties will be meeting at Lewis-Clark State College on September 8 to assess the economic and social effects of Idaho's new welfare law. Although formal notice of the meeting has not been circulated, a call to the college's Institute of Community Development on Monday of last week confirmed that the meeting is scheduled.

A joint venture between LCSC and the Idaho Department of Commerce, this Rural Partners meeting suggests that economists and community development leaders consider welfare as an integral part of a community's economic and social structure. For example, the state and numbers of the needy in a local community will have a marked effect on retail businesses. And in recent months, local community institutions have been looked to more and more as potential sources of supplemental help for the impoverished.

At their last meeting back on May 5, Rural Partners expressed concern over the welfare-to-work requirements of the new law. In their view too little thought had been given to the need to have job training and jobs available in local communities. Participants expressed concern that the new requirements would have an unanticipated effect upon part-time employment in rural communities, particularly for teenagers. Some anticipated that welfare

recipients would move to where jobs and training were available and that that would have a negative effect on the economies of Idaho's larger centers of population.

An Associated Press story in the August 9 issue of the Lewiston Morning Tribune reports that increasing numbers of impoverished Idaho Panhandle residents are fleeing across the border for better benefits in Washington State. Whether the same holds true for North Central Idaho remains to be seen. Who knows what the situation is in the counties represented in the Rural Partners coalition?

Since the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association was represented at the May meeting and since a call was made locally for a community study of the issues, it is assumed that the association's representatives will have something to report at the September 8 meeting. As for the other community institutions—the school district, the churches, the health care providers, the senior citizens organizations, the service groups, and the retail and service businesses—who knows what insights and recommendations they have regarding an issue that has been shifted from the Federal to the state level and that now appears to be a growing responsibility of the local community. If they do have input, now is the time to get it out in the open and share it. For the good of the whole community!
