### State of Idaho Files **Criminal Complaint**

Boise-On August 22, 1997, the State of Idaho filed a criminal complaint in the District Court of Latah County, charging Mary Bell Larson with one count of grand theft and five counts of tax evasion. Mary Bell Larson was a bookkeeper previously employed by the Kendrick Rochdale Elevator in Kendrick, Idaho. A preliminary hearing on the complaint has been set for September 11, On July 12, 1996, the Director of

the Idaho State Department of Agriculture, Patrick Takasugi, declared the Kendrick Rochdale warehouse failed as defined in the Idaho Bonded Warehouse Law. Under that law, the Director of Agriculture may declare a failure at any time he finds a warehouse is not able to financially satisfy claimants or the warehouse has failed to deliver commodities purchased or to re-deliver commodities held for storage. Director Takasugi requested an investigation by the Attorney General's

Eleven depositors made claims against the Commodity Indemnity Account and were paid \$211,060.03. The Commodity Indemnity Account Program (CIAP) is a producer funded \$5 million program wherein the producer of grain, beans or small seeds pays into a fund. Should a warehouse failure occur, upon review and approval by the CIAP Advisory Board, 90% of the claimants substantiated loss will be paid out of the fund.


