State of Idaho Files Criminal Complaint

Boise—On August 22, 1997, the State of Idaho filed a criminal complaint in the District Court of Latah County, charging Mary Bell Larson with one count of grand theft and five counts of tax evasion. Mary Bell Larson was a bookkeeper previously employed by the Kendrick Rochdale Elevator in Kendrick, Idaho. A preliminary hearing on the complaint has been set for September 11, 1997.

On July 12, 1996, the Director of the Idaho State Department of Agriculture, Patrick Takasugi, declared the Kendrick Rochdale warehouse failed as defined in the Idaho Bonded Warehouse Law. Under that law, the Director of Agriculture may declare a failure at any time he finds a warehouse is not able to financially satisfy claimants or the warehouse has failed to deliver commodities purchased or to re-deliver commodities held for storage. Director Takasugi requested an investigation by the Attorney General's office.

Eleven depositors made claims against the Commodity Indemnity Account and were paid \$211,060.03. The Commodity Indemnity Account Program (CIAP) is a producer funded \$5 million program wherein the producer of grain, beans or small seeds pays into a fund. Should a warehouse failure occur, upon review and approval by the CIAP Advisory Board, 90% of the claimants substantiated loss will be paid out of the fund.

While State Infrastructure Improvement is Writ Large

Calling Idaho's Welfare Reform law one of the most regressive in the nation, Mary Emery of Lewis-Clark State College reported at Monday's meeting of Rural Partners that the state has no idea of what happened to large numbers of welfare recipients who have dropped from the rolls. Authorities have no way of tracking where they are today, they and their families, including children who until recently were enrolled in local public schools. Representatives of two North Central Idaho communities in attendance reacted with blunt honesty: "Good riddance!"

Discussion that followed touched on the fact, as some see it, that welfare recipients don't want to work, no matter what. Others felt that even if some wanted to work, they would lack the most basic job skills required in any kind of employment. Some questioned whether the state was prepared to offer adequate job training programs. Emery reported that the state has ruled that no Federal funds may be used to

Kendrick Crushed Highland for 2nd Win; Genesee Here Friday

The Kendrick High School football team won its second straight game Saturday afternoon, rumbling over the Highland Huskies 60-14 at Craigmont in a Whitepine league contest. Friday night the Tigers will face their toughest opponent to date as they host the Genesee Bulldogs in a battle that begins at 7.

The Tigers racked up 418 yards of total offense while holding Highland to just 146 yards.

Tony Howerton, the Tiger's excellent tight end, paced the KHS attack with four pass receptions for 102 yards and four touchdown catches. Three other touchdowns by Tony were called back.

Kendrick quarterback Richie Hitchcock went 2-for-3 for 62 yards and a pair of touchdowns while his young backup Nate Eichner passed for 75 yards and three touchdowns.

Sophomore Andrew Heimgartner also sacked the Husky quarterback twice during the game.

Coach Kevin Driskill was happy to have a game in which he could play his younger players to give them experience.

Luck was with the Tigers most of the afternoon. On a broken punt play, punter Bryan Carter connected with Howerton for a 72-yard touchdown pass.

Kendrick got on the score board in the first quarter with Josh Blair recovering a blocked punt for the first touchdown. A Hitchcock to Howerton pass play was good for the second Tiger score.

The Tigers broke the game wide open in the second period scoring 22 points. A 47-yard Hitchcock to Howerton pass scored the touchdown and then the two repeated the scenario for the extra point. Nate Eichner passed to Matt Tefft for 21 yards and the next Tiger score and Sam Brown ran 5 yards for a third KHS score. Highland scored for the first time in the second quarter on a 17 yard run. The Tigers led 34-8 at halftime.

Kendrick poured it on in the third quarter with two more touchdowns. The first was Bryan Carter's pass to Jody Brown for 72 yards with Eichner passing to Howerton for the extra points. Eichner and Howerton clicked again in the third period on a 10 yard pass play.

In the final quarter Leach scored for Highland. Kendrick wrapped it up with another Eichner to Howerton pass for 31 yards and a score and then when Seth Parks scored from 3 yards out, the game was called on the "mercy rule."

support degree programs at Lewis-Clark State College for welfare recipients; although the state will support the cost of six-week job training programs. One can only wonder what kinds of jobs require only six weeks of instruction.

Emery reminded participants that some on welfare lack the native ability to learn to do even the simplest kind of job. What does the state hope to do for them? What are local communities prepared to do? Reaching no conclusions, the group agreed they need to monitor what happens in their local communities. No representative of the Kendrick-Julietta Community Development Association was on hand to share this community's insights into the problem.

Meanwhile infrastructure improvement continues at a brisk pace throughout nearly all the communities of the region. Jack Coyner, Potlatch reported plans are proceeding to establish a Community Resources Learning Center, for which grant applications are now being drafted. The facility will include a community meeting room to encourage more dialogue within the community concerning its future. Work is proceeding on Potlatch's scenic depot park, and a new RV park is "up and running!" A new medical clinic building has opened, providing the services of a nurse practitioner.

The economic development specialist for the Nez Perce tribe reported on a variety of projects in the works, including a new water plant for Lapwai, infrastructure developments at Aht'Wy Plaza, including a possible sewer hook-up with the city of Lewiston and flood plain mapping, possibly even the development of a hotel on the site. The tribe now has a community development specialist as well. Housing continues to be a challenge for the tribe, with the possibility that growth will have to "go up instead of out."

Kooskia now has a medical center serving the community five days a week in its own building. The Opera House continues to thrive, having put on a sold-out 6 night run of Carousel this summer. The new kiosk and interpretive center is coming along, with its grand opening scheduled for next spring. Kooskia also faces the challenges of a Main Street Project, with a hoped-for completion date of the year 2,000.

Elk City is thriving in the infrastructure department, too. Its medical center is now up and running in its very own building, although on a limited basis for now, and that thanks to grants and donations totaling \$125,000. Keith Kopischke of the Idaho Department of Commerce says that is the most leveraged \$10,000 grant in the history of Gem Community-operation. The city has also purchased a mine, a fully operative gold mine that they plan to turn into an interpretive center and museum. Earl Sherrer, reporting for Elk City's Gem team, says they're even involved in having microbes clean up spillage from a one-time gas station—and at a fraction of the cost that experts said it would cost! Elk City's chief challenge now is to find ways to attract overnight visitors there during the winter.

Bob Ford of the Department of Commerce said that this emphasis on infrastructure improvement in rural Gem Communities was fully expected. The industrial development model just doesn't work for rural Idaho, but small town leaders know that they have to do everything they can to improve their infrastructure to maintain the businesses they have and, hopefully, to attract some new ones. Mary Emery pointed to Kendrick-Julietta's outstanding record of acquiring grant funding to improve infrastructure.

There for his first meeting with Rural Partners was Mayor John Blom of Troy, who reported on their efforts to get Troy recertified as a Gem Community. Blom hopes that the Main Street project may be an instrument to "bring people together." He foresees that budgeting will be a problem. He is concerned, too, that the city's 12 to 13 acres of forest up on Moscow Mountain might prove a source of conflict, some feeling that no more timber should be cut and others citing it as a principal source of needed funds for infrastructure improvement. He stressed the need for communication with the people and to that end includes a newsletter with the monthly water bill. He is concerned, too, with the need to involve the people out in the areas of impact, even though they're not citizens of Troy.

Next week your reporter will review what participants in the Rural Partners meeting learned about a proposed new way of helping community leaders meet their goal of business retention and expansion. Again, the community of Kendrick-Julietta—thanks to the tireless efforts of go-getter Phyllis Berg—already has a program well worth copying throughout the region. More next time.

State Critizes Nursing Home Scare Tactics

The Department of Health and Welfare recently rejected claims eliminating double payments to nursing homes will reduce the quality of care.

Nursing home lobbyists and operators have sued the State in U. S. District Court to overturn a rule which seeks to protect Idaho taxpayers by eliminating an estimated \$5.6 million a year in double payments to the industry. Administrators of nursing homes involved in the lawsuit admit in court documents that the new "carve-out" rule will not reduce the quality of care to patients.

"The disposition testimony of these administrators demonstrated that the impact of the 'carve out' on their operation is very small... and that there is no realistic risk that any of them will close or reduce services," said the State's brief. "Even with the new rule and extra protection for taxpayers, the average rates to Idaho nursing homes for 1997 will be higher than they have ever been before," said DeAnne Moore, administrator of the Department's Division of Medicaid. The Department rejected quality-

of-care claims by the Idaho Health Care Association and administrators of the Holly Hills Care Center in Emmett, Mountain View Care Center of Kimberly and Wood River Care Center in Lincoln County.

The State's brief said: "Holly Hills pays substantial management and consultant fees to its parent company, Sunrise Health Care Corp. of Albuquerque, N. M. Mountain View, owned and managed by out-of-state firms, has lost money since 1994 and no steps have been taken to close it or reduce services, the administrator of that facility said.

The new rule prohibits nursing homes from charging the State-administered Medicaid program for the same costs they charge to the federally administered Medicare program. Both are taxpayer-funded pro-

grams that cover medical costs for certain groups of people. The rule change is known as a "carve-out" because Medicaid "carves" Medicare covered costs out of bills before paying them. Previously, nursing homes were able to bill both programs for the same costs.

"There have been assertions that the carve-out will harm nursing home patients," said Moore. "This is a scare tactic and is unfair to the people who make their homes in these facilities. This rule is about stopping double dipping. It means taxpayers won't have to foot the bill for inflated costs."

The State's brief quotes sworn depositions of nursing home admin-

istrators. They admit the State "would be justified in protecting itself from paying for costs that are actually attributable to Medicare recipients." The brief says the double-payment problem "has increased in recent years to the point that the carve-out correction is urgently needed."

"We have been talking with the industry since 1995, we discussed this with the Legislature and public hearings were held to ensure everyone in Idaho had an opportunity to help find a solution to this problem."
