Juliaetta PTO Plans Winter Clothing Project

Twenty-seven parents and teachers met on Monday, Sept. 15 to select leadership and discuss projects and priorities for the school year. Janice Gobbi and Rose Norris have accepted the roles of co-chairs and Danielle Snyder has accepted the role of secretary. There was some discussion of the origin and purpose of the organization. The guiding principle seems to be "parents and teachers working together to do things that didn't get done before—An ongoing line of communication."

Several important topics were discussed as those present tackled a full agenda. Ideas were still flowing when the meeting ended at 7:30 in holding with the promised one-hour meeting schedule. Topics the October meeting to be held in left on the table will be revisited at the school cafeteria at 6:30, Oct. 20. All community members are urged to place this matter on their calendars.

Kari Galloway and Ellen Magnuson, representing the J-K Arts Committee, shared their goal "Binging Arts to Rural Communities" with the group and asked for help. Before they left, six community members had stepped to the plate and agreed to work with them.

The Winter Clothing Project was a hot topic with the group agreeing that this was an important project and needed to be initiated as soon as possible. Clothing items will be collected at the Open House on September 22. Anyone having clothing to donate who did not bring it to the Open House is asked to drop it off at the school office as soon as possible so it can be put to good use.

Other topics warranting attention included the Book Fair which will run in conjunction with fall parent conferences to be held November 6 and 7. A T-shirt sale to encourage continuing pride in the school was discussed, as was a student awards program to recognize the small acts of kindness and excellence that our students commit often and which, so often, go un-noticed. Boxtops for Education which was discussed in a school newsletter and the desire to continue the Campbell Soup label project that has been ongoing for several years were viewed favorably.

An important topic which has been the object of fund-raisers and attention has been the playground improvement project. This project is clearly important to all of us and, while we would all like to see the fruits of these labors, there is also an awareness of the need for quality long-range planning before anything is done. Dr. Taylor will be invited to a future PTO meeting to share School District past accomplishments in this area as well as future plans.

As you can see, the PTO is a viable group which can make an appreciable difference in the education of our youth.

Jack G. Browning, Juliaetta Mill Owner Claimed by Cancer

Jack G. Browning, the owner of Browning Cut Stock Co. at Juliaetta, died of cancer Saturday, Sept. 20, 1997, at Royal Plaza Care Center at Lewiston. He was 78.

He was born Sept. 5, 1919, at Buck Prairie, Missouri, to Clarence and Viola Hemphill Browning. The family moved to Juliaetta in 1935 and he graduated from Juliaetta High School in 1937. He married Dixie Peters July 16, 1938 at Lewiston.

During World War II, Browning served as a petty officer 1st class in the U. S. Navy in the Pacific Theater. After the war, he painted service stations for the Atlantic Richfield Oil Company.

He worked at various mills as a millwright before founding Browning Cut Stock Co. in Juliaetta in 1964. He semi-retired in 1992. Family, work and travel were his greatest joys.

He is survived by his wife at the family home in Juliaetta; one daughter, Montez Steigers of Juliaetta; one son, Gary Browning of Juliaetta; four grandchildren; and 10 great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by three brothers, Bernard, Harold and Joe Browning.

A private graveside service was held Monday at the Juliaetta Cemetery with the Rev. Mark Fischer of the Juliaetta Community Church officiating.

A memorial service was conducted Wednesday at the Juliaetta Community Church with Rev. Fischer officiating.

Statewide Testing in School October 6-10

The Iowa Tests of Basic Skills (ITBS-2-8), the Brigance Diagnostic Inventory of Basic Skills (K, 1), and the Test of Achievement and Proficiency (TAP-9-12) will be administered at the schools during the week of October 6-10.

Juliaetta Elementary:
Grades K, 1: Brigance Diagnostic Inventory of Basic Skills.
Grades 2, 4, 6: ITBS Survey test.

Grades 3, 5: ITBS Complete battery (longer and more comprehensive).

Kendrick High School & Jr. High: Grades 8, 10, 11, & 12th (make-ups). Survey test — Tuesday, October 7.

Grades 7, 9: Complete battery—Oct. 7, 8, 9 (1st-3rd periods).
Parents and guardians: You can help:

- 1) ensure your child gets plenty of sleep the night before the tests.
- 2) make certain your child has breakfast on the morning(s) of the test.
- 3) help your child arrive to school on time on the day(s) of the test.
- 4) let your child know you think she/he can do their best on the test.

If your child will be absent from jr. high or high school during testing, it is his/her responsibility to obtain a pre-arranged absence slip so that assignments can be completed before the absence, and when making up the test. There is only a certain window of time in which to give the tests before they must be sent to the State Department of Education. All testing will be completed before October 24.

If you or anyone you know has children who are home-schooled or are in a private school and wish to be tested, please contact Mrs. Kirkham at the high school (289-8332) or Mr. Gilson at the Elementary school (276-3422) before October 1.

Test scores are used for curriculum planning, limited placement in certain programs (such as Title I), measuring individual progress over time, and are required for grades 3-11 by the State Department of Education.

LCSC Offers Workshop In Recording Local Family History Oct. 4

Responding to many Gem Community members' requests, Lewis-Clark State College has scheduled a workshop on Saturday, October 4, to teach people how to record family and local history. The place, the Williams Conference Center at LCSC; the hours, 9 a. m. until 4:00 p. m. The \$10.00 participant fee includes lunch and beverages.

State Historical Society representatives and others will cover a broad variety of topics, including interviewing, transcribing, videotaping, genealogy, and internet research. Dumpster Leland as new Garbage Collection System Begins

Approximately 122 Nez Perce County residences on Potlatch Ridge got the word last Friday from Latah Sanitation, Inc. As of October 1 there will be no more dumpsters to abuse in Leland. On that day the new driveway-to-driveway garbage pickup system will begin.

And it was because of the various abuses of the dumpster service that the change was initiated by the Nez Perce County Commissioners working in cooperation with the Moscow-based sanitation service. Despite futile efforts to limit the kinds of trash that could be dumped in the containers, the Sanitation Service has had to struggle with the stubborn and at times defiant individuals who overloaded the dumpsters with practically everything — including,

Tigers Dropped By Deary 48-0

The Kendrick Tigers lost more than a football game last Friday on the KHS field. The Tigers lost the services of their starting quarterback Richie Hitchcock, who suffered a broken left leg, and will be out of action for 3 or 4 months.

While the Tigers were walloped in the one-sided contest against the unbeaten Mustangs, Kendrick did have the honor of taking the Mustangs into the fourth quarter before the 45-point mercy rule was invoked.

The Mustangs were dominant as usual in the first quarter, running six offensive plays and scoring on three of them. They also punched in all three conversion attempts and led 24-0 at the end of the first period and scored twice again in the first half.

Both teams went scoreless in the third quarter before Deary scored twice in the fourth quarter. An 11-yard run by Jason Hanson in the fourth quarter put the Mustangs more than 45 points ahead and that ended the game.

Richie Hitchcock, the injured Tiger quarterback's left leg was broken about 3 or 4 inches above the ankle in the Deary game. He was taken to the hospital where a full-leg cast was placed on the broken leg. His mother, Tammy, said Monday that in a short time a less extensive cast will be put on the leg.

literally, the kitchen sink! And free-loaders coming in from other counties with their garbage and trash didn't help matters either.

As of next Wednesday, a Latah Sanitation truck will make the complex rounds of county roads on Potlatch Ridge, pausing at each "driveway" to pick up no more than three 32-gallon garbage cans or securely tied plastic bags, cans weighing no more than 60 pounds, bags no more than 35. And, please it will prove helpful if even the trash and garbage put out in cans is first placed in plastic bags.

For those concerned about using plastic bags that can be ripped open by predators, the word from Latah Sanitation is that elsewhere in both rural Nez Perce and Latah Counties this practice has not caused a problem. The service does ask, however, that residents strictly observe the volume and weight limitations.

Obviously the volume and weight limitations do act to put limits on what can be left out for pickup. Where does the old kitchen sink go now, along with all the other broken, tired stuff of household? For now, Nez Perce County residents can take it to the one-stop pickup point at the intersection of Gifford Road and Highway 12 on the second and fourth Saturday of the month. The reasonable alternative—to use the Juliaetta one-stop service—is not available to Nez Perce County residents at this time.

Perhaps the Nez Perce County Commissioners can be persuaded to attempt some cooperative arrangement with their counterparts in Latah County.

Residents are advised to call the Latah Sanitation office at 746-5949 if they have questions, comments or concerns. Be advised that this number—which is a 208 long distance number on the Ridge—will connect the caller with Latah Sanitation's office in Moscow. The number is a toll-free number for some, but not all, Nez Perce County customers of the service. The same courtesy for Potlatch Ridge customers would seem to be in order.

Another source of information concerning the service is Latah Sanitation's newsletter, Waste Not. Your reporter had been assuming all along that the only reason he received it was that it was addressed to him in Kendrick. No, it's meant for all of us who are served by Latah Sanitation. Reading it will help keep us all up-to-date on recycling efforts and on news concerning our garbage collection service.

While Relene Johnson, Vice-President of Latah Sanitation, knows that there will be problems during the transition period, she is ready in every way to help resolve them. And knows from years of experience in rural pick-up that it will work in the long run. If thorough planning is any guarantee of success, then Nez Perce County Road Department's Marilyn deserves our thanks. She helped map the pick-up routes on the Ridge, traveling every mile and checking on the locations and numbers of residences.

Ultimately, of course, it is the Nez Perce County Commissioners who are accountable for the success of this new system. Be aware the ongoing process of assessment and evaluation is public business and that you are entitled to be informed and to have input. With cooperation all around, the new system may soon prove to be a winner. One thing's sure: There will be a nicer smell and look about Leland beginning next Wednesday. Now who can kick about that!
