People Reminded to Avoid Contact with Bats

Two recent brushes with bats indicate Idahoans may have become too complacent about rabies.

"People should be careful around bats. They are known to carry rabies," said Dr. Christine Hahn, the state epidemiologist. "Bats should not be handled. If someone has touched a bat or is touched by a bat, they should seek the immediate advice of their physician on whether to receive rabies shots."

Seven rabid bats have been found in Idaho this year. Two Idahoans—one in southwestern Idaho and another in North Idaho—are receiving rabies shots after coming into contact with rabid bats.

No human cases of rabies have been reported in Idaho since 1978. However, a Montana man died recently after a bat brushed him in his bedroom. "The potential for human cases is here in Idaho, as well," said Roy Moulton, virus expert at the state public health laboratory.

Although rare, rabies is almost 100 percent fatal. There is no cure. Hahn recommends pet owners vaccinate their cats and dogs against rabies and try to keep their pets away from bats.

"Cats often capture and play with sick bats," Hahn said. "If a bat looks sick, it might have rabies and should be avoided. We have had to quarantine several unvaccinated cats for 6 months after they came in contact with rabid bats."

Gayle was one of about 150 4-H leaders, teens, and parents from around Idaho participating in this conference designed to help 4-H volunteer leaders gain additional skills in working with youth. It was also a time of sharing and fun.

This year's theme, "Running the Rapids of Change," helped the committee create nearly 40 workshops that were designed to inform leaders and further their abilities to adapt to changes. Topic choices included 4-H projects, leadership skills, and hands-on activities.

The conference officially began with a Saturday luncheon featuring Jamie Pinkham as the keynote speaker. He spoke about diversity and tolerance.

Sharing time and displays from various counties across the state gave the 4-H adult and teen leaders an opportunity to exchange and learn new ideas.

A highlight of the forum was a workshop given by Mac Bledsoe of the Drev Bledsoe Foundation entitled, "Five Rules for Assessing the Script," this workshop gave adults immediate tools to use when working with youth. Mr. Bledsoe was also the keynote speaker at the Monday luncheon.

Bledsoe's 5 simple rules to access the "Script" are:

1. End any criticism with a positive statement of expected behavior. In behavioral terms that they can understand.
2. Criticize performance and not the person.
3. Do not assume that they have heard it simply because you have said it—REPEAT it!
4. After 3 repetitions—change the words.
5. It does not matter what you say; it is what they say to themselves that counts.

Self-motivation is the only kind of motivation.

Send a constant message of love.

- a. Love is not something you say; it is something you do.
- b. The time that they need to hear it is the time that you feels least able to say it.

"Tell kids what we want them to do—Not what we don't want them to do."

**Nursing Homes Agree
To Dismiss Lawsuit
Against State**

Idaho nursing home lobbyists and operators have dropped their lawsuit against the state an agreed to follow a new policy that eliminates double payments to the industry. Some nursing homes and their Idaho Health Care Association sued the Department of Health and Welfare this summer over a July 1 rule change known as a "carve out." Under the rule, the Medicaid program now "carves" Medicare-covered costs out of bills before taxpayer funds are used to pay them. Under previous accounting methods, nursing homes were able to bill both the state-run Medicaid program and the federal Medicare program for some of the same costs. The new rule requires nursing homes to identify all the costs of Medicare services so they are not also paid by Medicaid. The industry has estimated the new accounting process will reduce industry income by \$5.6 million annually. "The nursing homes agree with the concept that each program should pay only for the costs of its own services," said DeeAnn Moore, administrator of the Department's Division of Medicaid. "Even with the new accounting practice, nursing home reimbursement is higher than ever," Moore said. "The reimbursement level is high enough to maintain quality of care in Idaho's nursing homes, which is our highest concern." Medicaid will pay nursing homes an average daily rate of \$91.34 per patient, up from \$88.29 last year. As part of the dismissal of the case, Health Care Assoc. and nursing homes involved in the lawsuit agreed to pay the State's cost of deposition and hearing transcripts.
