"People should be careful around bat. They are known to carry rabies," said Dr. Christine Hahn the state epidemiologist, "Bats should not be handled. If someone has touched a bat or is touched by a bat, they should seek the immediate advice of their physician on whether to receive rabies shots."

Nursing Homes Agree To Dismiss Lawsuit **Against State**

Idaho nusing home lobbyists an perators have dropped their la suit against the state an agreed follow a new polcy that eliminat louble payments to the industry.

Some nursing homes and the daho Health Care Association suc the Department of Health and Wel tare this summer over a July 1 rul change known as a "carve out Under the rule, the Medicaid pro gram now "carves" Medicare-cover ed costs out of bills before taxpaye unds are used to pay them.

Under previous accounting met hods, nursing homes were able bill both the state-run Medical rogram and the federal Medicar rogram for some of the same cost The new rule requires nursing home to identify all the costs of Medicar ervices so they are not also paid by Medicaid. The industry has estima ted the new accounting process will reduce industry income by \$5.6 mil hen annually,

"The nursing homes agree wit he concept that each program hould pay only for the costs of it own services," said DecAnn Moor administrator of the Department Division of Medicaid.

"Even with the new accounting practice, nursing home reimbursement is higher than ever," Moore add. "The reimbursement level is high enough to maintain quality of care in Idaho's nursing homes, which is our highest concern." Medeaid will pay nursing homes an average daily rate of \$91.34 per paient, up from \$88.29 last year.
