Lillian O. Lowry, 96, Formerly of Juliaetta, Dies October 8

Lillian Ottosen Lowry, a former Juliaetta resident, died October 8, at the Masonic Home in Des Moines, Washington from causes related to age. She was 96.

She was born May 4, 1901, in Swift County, Minn., to Louis Neils and Mary Etta Ottosen. The family moved west by train and settled at Mount Hope, Wash. Later they farmed on the Camas Prairie. In 1908 they moved to Juliaetta, where she attended grade and high school. She also attended Lewiston State Normal School, now Lewis-Clark State College.

She taught at the old Grey Eagle Country School near Genesee and at Rockland, Idaho.

She met Ernest Lowry at Rockland, and they were married Aug. 20, 1920, at Juliaetta. They lived at Elk River and Central Point, Or., then moved to Tacoma. Her husband drowned in a fishing boat accident at Neah Bay, Wash., in 1960s. She remained in Tacoma until entering the Masonic Home at Des Moines in the mid-1980s.

She is survived by one son, Richard Lowry of Poulbo, Wash., and one daughter, Deann Roth of Tacoma; one sister, Crystal Gruell of Lewiston; three grandchildren; and five great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by a son, Robert; two daughters, Donna and Dorothy Lowry; and one brother, Godfrey Ottosen.

Cremation has taken place. A memorial service will be Oct. 29 at the Masonic House at Des Moines.

P. T. O. Forms Playground Develop. Committee

After hearing Dr. Eldon Taylor, Kendrick School District superintendent, share information about the school district's long term commitment to the development of the elementary school facilities, the group took advantage of his invitation that they form a Playground Develop. Committee to provide input into playground improvement issues. Dr. Taylor reported that recently a combination slide and swing set had to be removed after determining that it posed a danger to students. The removal of this piece of playground equipment provided open space. The committee will be making recommendations regarding the best use of that space. The PTO group has about \$4,000 set aside for playground improvement as a result of the last bike-a-thon.

The PTO group, with 21 adults present also shared committee reports. The J-K Arts Committee shared plans for the Halloween Festival; the Winter Wear Distribution committee reported its plans to host a distribution in the elementary school cafeteria on Saturday, October 25, from nine o'clock until two o'clock. Anyone needing winter wear or having winter wear to donate is invited to participate.

Another major project which will happen soon is the "Book Fair" which will be held in conjunction with the parent conferences on November 6 and 7. Students will be given an opportunity to browse the collection on Wednesday and it will be open to parents on Thursday and Friday.

Other topics of discussion included Boxtops for Education, Celebration of Excellence, DARE, and the future of fundraising by this organization. A committee chaired by Danielle Snyder and Lynnette Johnson was formed to investigate fundraising opportunities that would minimize students selling in the community, yet raise the needed funds to carry on a significant activity program for students.

The next meeting will be held in the cafeteria on November 17 at 6:30. Child care will be provided to make it more convenient for parents to attend.

Local Arts Committee Members Testified At State Meeting in Lewiston

Last Thursday, Ellen Magnuson, Kari Galloway and Phyllis Berg of the J-K Arts Committee attended the Idaho Commission on the Arts Commission meeting in Lewiston. The three arts committee members had the opportunity to meet the commission members, many newly-appointed, who determine the policies and procedures for Idaho arts funding. Both Galloway and Berg testified during the public comments session of the Lewis-Clark Center for Arts and History event. They shared some of the past and future accomplishments of the local arts committee, its benefits to both the community and individuals and told

of the need for continued funding and support by the State Commission.

Commission members were very impressed with the calendar of events that the local arts committee has scheduled for the first time this year. They were amazed that such an ambitious undertaking could happen in a community as small as Kendrick and Juliaetta.

The Idaho Commission, with about 15 members, is largely from the Boise area and the rest of southern Idaho. Members expressed their appreciation at being able to visit in northern Idaho with its distinctive scenery.

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Holiday Eating

Halloween without candy? Thanksgiving without turkey? Christmas without cookies? For many, the holiday just wouldn't be complete without the seasonal food and drink prepared and enjoyed with families, friends and co-workers.

Yet if thoughts of indulging in festive goodies have you fretting about post-holiday weight gain, take note. Taking time to prepare for the festive eating season can help you identify ways to help you identify ways to help make your holiday a little bit more healthy.

"Thinking ahead, planning and being prepared is probably the biggest thing that will get you through the holidays without gaining a few extra pounds along the way," says Sybil Gautreau, clinical nutritionist and registered dietitian with University of Washington Medical Center. "The holiday season doesn't have to be a time of deprivation, but moderation is a good idea."

The best approach to altering eating habits should include a combination of limiting the amount of food you eat, altering recipes with healthy substitutions and removing tempting foods from your reach. To help you eat well, feel well and maintain your weight, Gautreau offers the following tips for healthy holiday eating.

At home:
* Try altering high-fat and calorie-laden dishes by substituting healthier ingredients.
* Avoid decorating the house with candy dishes and cookie jars.
* Chew on gum while cooking to keep you from snacking.
* Freeze treats after you bake them and take out only the amount you need when guests arrive.
* Have low-calorie and non-alcoholic beverages on hand for guests.
* Alter dip, pie and sauce recipes

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* Don't deprive yourself of your favorite foods, but eat smaller portions.

* To avoid having leftovers in the fridge, don't prepare more food than you need.

At work:
* Take low-fat snacks to munch on during the day instead of other treats.

* Avoid those areas where treats are kept. If they are located in the lunch room, try eating somewhere else.

* Don't skip meals to justify eating snacks throughout the day. Most holiday treats provide few nutrients and are not a substitute for a well-balanced meal.

* Limit yourself to one treat per day. Select the items in the morning and save it for the end of the day so you have something to look forward to.

* Bring low-calorie, healthy dishes for office parties so you will have at least one nutritious choice.

* Don't feel obligated to eat food items co-workers bring in. Try a small portion or refuse politely, saying it looks delicious but you just can't eat another bite.

At parties:
* Eat a salad or other healthy food before arriving so you won't be as tempted to fill up on snack foods.

* Avoid temptation by standing away from the buffet table.

* Remember that alcohol stimulates appetite, so drink water or diet pop instead.

* Be selective. Rather than sampling all the foods before you, select a

few that look most appealing and have a small portion.

* Take your mind off food by engaging in conversations with other guests.

* If they're offered, opt for fresh vegetables and limit rich gravies, sauces and fried foods.

"Being a smart social eater does not mean that you have to deprive yourself," stresses Gautreau. "You have an enjoyable holiday season by planning ahead for those occasions when you'll control your food consumption, then allowing yourself to splurge at others."
