**Grizzly Bear Plan Offers False Promise of "Citizen Management"**  
 A Guest Opinion by Attorney General Al Lance

Recently I had the opportunity to testify at a public hearing in Lewiston regarding a US Fish and Wildlife Service proposal to reintroduce grizzly bears into central Idaho. On behalf of the State of Idaho, I asked the Fish and Wildlife Service to withdraw its flawed plan.

While some have described the "citizen management committee" alternative as "a reasonable compromise" and "flexible," I believe it is neither.

The plan's proponents have accepted the premise that the only choice is between "citizen managed" grizzly bears and "federally managed" grizzly bears. This is not true. Unfortunately, the Fish and Wildlife Service has exploited the public's unfamiliarity with the law governing "experimental" and "non-essential" species introduction. Many Idahoans now believe, incorrectly, that Fish and Wildlife must transplant grizzly bears into central Idaho.

The Endangered Species Act does not require grizzly bears in central Idaho. Grizzly bears are not an endangered species. Grizzly bear recovery in the Yellowstone area has

been so successful that Governor Batt and the governors of Montana and Wyoming have asked that the population be removed from the threatened species list.

The words "experimental" and "non-essential" tell the real story of the central Idaho plan. Grizzly bear introduction is entirely discretionary. There is no legal requirement for the Fish and Wildlife Service to take any action regarding grizzly bears in central Idaho.

The debate should be over how to manage grizzly bears. The debate should focus on why the federal government is exercising its discretionary power in a way that conflicts with the wishes of a majority of Idahoans. The Fish and Wildlife Service has never explained why it feels compelled to push ahead with an experiment the law does not require.

A second fallacy is that citizens will really manage these "experimental," "non-essential," and not-legally-required grizzly bears.

If the plan were truly "flexible," it might warrant support. However, the much-touted "flexibility" is based on flawed biology and false promises.

Much of the proposed recovery area has never been adequately studied to determine its suitability for grizzly bears. Without such a study, it would be impossible for the citizen management committee to make reasoned decisions concerning grizzly bear recovery. That is why the Idaho Fish and Game Commission opposes reintroduction.

Furthermore, the citizen management committee is a decoy. The USFWS will call the shots and the citizen committee will take the heat. Here are some facts the proponents of "citizen management" are not sharing with the public:

1. The Secretary of Interior appoints the entire committee.
2. When the Secretary's personal representative disagrees with the rest of the committee, he or she can bypass the committee and go directly to the Secretary.
3. If the Secretary objects to the committee's actions, he can order the committee to change its actions.
4. If the committee refuses to follow the Secretary's wishes—the Secretary can disband the committee after six months.

The citizen committee will be little more than the pawn of the Secretary of Interior. That is neither "flexible" nor a "reasonable compromise."

Regardless of how it is sold, the presence of grizzly bears will mean land use restrictions and the serious injury or death of Idahoans.

While the federal government's words may be appealing, its past conduct convinces me that the Fish and Wildlife Service will manage grizzly bears on its own terms. You cannot expect the Fish and Wildlife Service to be any more flexible with grizzly bears than it has been with wolves and bull trout.

I hope interested Idahoans will read the Fish and Wildlife Service's plan, "Grizzly Bear Recovery in the Bitterroot Ecosystem: Draft Environmental Impact Statement." It is available at the Lewiston City Library and on the internet (<http://www.wrfws.gov>). Those who read it will see that the citizen management committee is not what its proponents make it out to be.

I will continue, with Governor Batt and Idaho's entire congressional delegation, to represent the wishes of Idahoans by resisting grizzly bear reintroduction.

## Park News

The kaleidoscope of fall colors lasted only a few days in Park as the rain Sunday night bleached most of the leaves. Most are still hanging on the brush, making hunting difficult. Hunting pressure remains light but a few of the die-hards are giving rational hunters a bad name by leaving gates open, actually damaging one gate, and running motorized vehicles on CPR ground and pasture land. One wonders how these irresponsible people would react if a farmer traced a trespasser to his home, turned circles in his front lawn and used a chain to pull down his garage door . . . !

Some people may not know that running a vehicle on pasture land compacts the soil, stunting the growth of new grass. The Conservation Reserve Program was set up to take erodible land out of production, establishing a good bed of sod to keep the land from washing. A farmer also has to control weeds and keep cattle from pasturing on the fields. Running vehicles on the sod can make deep tracks so the soil washes anyway. Damage to the CPR planting can cause the farmer to lose his payment, and in severe cases, can make him repay payments back to the start of his contract. Is it any wonder that more land is being posted?
