Orville Skaggs, Former Juliaetta Businessman, Claimed by Cancer

Orville E. Skaggs, a formerly Juliaetta businessman and resident, passed away at the Blue Mtn. Medical Center at College Place, Wash. of cancer November 15, 1997.

He was born in Indianapolis, Indiana June 8, 1916, to Anna and Joseph Skaggs. He was a carpenter and lived and worked in Indiana and Kentucky. He married Olean Pruitt of Magnolia, Kentucky in 1939. They were later divorced. He married Beverly Bragg of Indianapolis. They lived in Indianapolis until 1956 when they moved to El Monte, California. He worked for Angeles Trailer Mfg. until 1961 when they moved to Juliaetta. In 1962 he started Sundowner Camper Mfg. He and his wife both worked in the business until his retirement in 1982. She preceded him in death in September of 1983. He married Marilyn Thornton of Clarkston in 1992 and they divorced in 1994. For the past year he lived with his daughter Jean Jordan, in Pendleton, Oregon until recent ill health and he entered Blue Mtn. Medical Center.

He was an avid hunter and fisherman all of his adult years. He also enjoyed playing card games.

He is survived by two daughters, Jean Jordan of Pendleton and Carolyn Brown of Juliaetta; a son, Terry Skaggs of Desert Springs, Calif.; a sister, Juanita Honn of Indianapolis; two brothers, William Skaggs of Indianapolis and James Skaggs of Carmichael, Calif.; five grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Two sisters and four brothers preceded him in death.

Memorial services will be held at Juliaetta Community Church Saturday, Nov. 22 at 2:00 p. m., with the Rev. Mark Fischer officiating. Cremation has taken place. A graveside service will follow the memorial service at the Juliaetta Cemetery.

Memorials may be made to the Juliaetta Community Church, the Juliaetta Centennial Park, or the J-K Ambulance Fund in Kendrick.

A brief lecture was given on the proper way to fly the flag at night with a direct light on the flag and not a street light from a distance. Following this, 192 young students and faculty members recited the Pledge of Allegiance to conclude the program.

S. Navy.

From Kendrick, Bob Rollins, Dammarell and Chief Jones traveled up to the Deary school. After a dinner, compliments of VFW member Stan Cox, the group went to the Deary HS gymnasium to a student body assembly where 250 students and faculty members listened as Bob Rollins again told of how Veterans Day came to be.

At the beginning of the program the assembly heard an excellent trio of young students sing The Star Spangled Banner; Bob Rollins presented his address and Stan Cox read a poem on "What is a Veteran."

Following the general assembly the student body officers walked to the memorial in the Deary park to lay a wreath and hear the names of veterans who gave their lives for their country. Following a brief benediction, Taps was played by two students.

Kendrick School District Food Service Awarded Grant for Milk Cooler

Students in Kendrick School District No. 283 will be refreshed each day with delicious cold milk at breakfast and lunch thanks to \$1,000 financial gain by their school food service. Kendrick School District is one of ten school districts in Idaho to share in \$10,000 of grant money from the United Dairymen of Idaho and Idaho Dairy Council. Working with the Idaho School Food Service Association, the grants were awarded to help defray the cost of purchasing a milk cooler. Milk coolers are free-standing refrigeration units that keep milk the proper serving temperature for great taste and good health.

"We began the milk cooler program several years ago, after we conducted a survey on the serving temperature of milk in Idaho schools," says Jean Zaske, registered dietitian (RD) with the Idaho Dairy Council. "Many schools in Idaho don't have milk coolers or use during meal serving times. Those schools take crates of milk from refrigerators and place them on the lunch lines. This practice can lead to warm milk, which children may not want to drink."

"Milk coolers increase milk consumption and decrease food waste." The real winners are the students who enjoy their entire carton of icy cold milk and in the process improve their intake of critical nutrients such as calcium," concludes Zaske. Recently the National Academy of Sciences released recommendations that increase the amount of calcium that children elementary through high school age need for optimal bone growth and development.

"We were thrilled to get a milk cooler for Juliaetta Elementary," says Irene Thornton, Kendrick School Food Service District Supervisor. "The students are enjoying the cold milk and we know they are getting a nutritious boost to their learning. We thank the United Dairymen of Idaho and Idaho Dairy Council for their continued support of our program and our students."

Traffic to be Detoured During Work on Cedar Ridge Road

Traffic will be detoured during blasting operations on the Cedar Ridge Road repair project in Latah County that began Tuesday, the announced.

The project will repair and restore 19 sites within an eight-mile section of the county road northeast of Kendrick that were damaged during the past two winters.

The detour will be in effect intermittently, and only on days when blasting will occur. Signs will direct traffic onto the detour route. From Kendrick, traffic will be detoured to Wanchar Gulch Road through Southwick, left on Three Bear Road then left on Cedar Ridge Road.

On days when blasting does not occur, flaggers will guide traffic through the work zone. Motorists can expect delays of up to 15 minutes during those times.

The contractor for this \$413,000 project is Latah Tree Farms and Construction, Inc. of Moscow. Work may go through December, weather permitting.

Latah County Parent Project Workshop in Deary Begins November 18

Latah County Parent Project is proud to present a series of Parenting Workshop located at Deary High School. The program will meet on Tuesday evenings from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m., November 18 through January 27, 1998. There is no fee to sign-up for the course—the only cost associated is \$20 for a workbook.

The workshop requires the purchase of a workbook that can be used as a reference manual. The facilitators of the workshop are required to attend a 40 hour training session in order to present the series.
