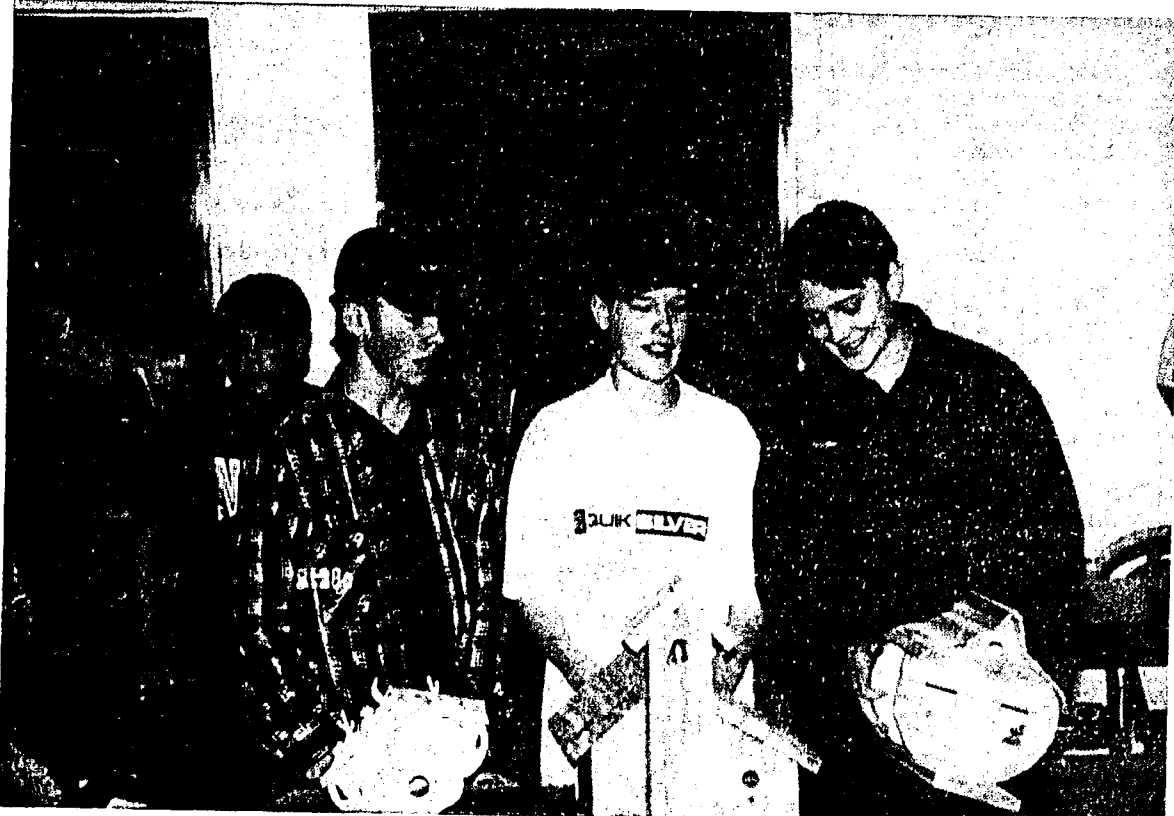

Monday, November 24 the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation visited the Kendrick Junior and Senior High School to say thanks to the 7th and 8th graders who built the bird houses for table centerpieces that will be auctioned off at the Foundation banquet March 7, at the Nez Perce County Fairgrounds.

At the start of the semester Marv Eveland needed a project for the students in his shop class. He was referred to Elaine Galloway who suggested bird houses for the RMEF banquet. With several donations of wood from Potlatch Corp. and Gem State Lumber of Juliaetta, the kids were off and running. The students had to draw their plans, transfer to wood, cut the wood, assemble the houses and paint or finish them as they wished. They learned math skills, how to handle shop equipment and finish the items.

There were three that awarded a grand prize of a free ticket to the banquet for their project.

Some of the houses are whimsical and others are just plain. The plain ones are being decorated with millet, corns, sorghum, mosses, lichens, and dried flowers that are grown locally.

An Hour with Sheriff's Deputy Ron Skiles

Kendrick got the best of both worlds when Richard Skiles was sent to replace Rich Campbell, whom we hated to lose. Deputy Skiles is a native and long-time resident of Latah County. Kendrick has avoided the high cost and liability of hiring its own full-time law enforcement officer by contracting with the Latah County Sheriff's Department for several hours of additional patrolling each week. Combined with the school district's contract, Officer Skiles spends about 20 hours each week in Kendrick. One never knows just when he might be patrolling, because he varies his shifts with the need of the community.

In getting to know Officer Skiles, you get the real feeling of his commitment to maintain our quality of life. Growing up in Deary he respects the needs of our youth to have healthy activities that are fun, otherwise they may turn to unlawful activities. "A Youth Center or some place that the kids can hang out and play some games," emphasizes Skiles, would prevent many of the youth from becoming a concern for the city. "When they (the youth) are bored, they WILL find something to do, and we might have a kid in trouble that didn't need to be," he added. Kendrick still has some problems with drug trafficking, but it's less than before. Most of the prior problems associated with drugs have seemed to move to other communities that are not as regularly patrolled.

Skiles has always wanted to be in law enforcement because of the opportunities to help people, the interaction with people, and the challenges and adventures that come with the job. He noted that he would not want to be a full-time deputy at this point in his life, he enjoys his other part-time work in construction. Skiles lives in Deary with his wife and 22-month old son.

Officer Skiles doesn't have a patrol vehicle dedicated to this position so he often will drive his own vehicle to fulfill his contract with the school in Kendrick. He enjoys getting to know the junior and senior high students and feels the community has "good students."

During his talk with this reporter a pair of "our" youth made it a point to get a wave and smile to "our" deputy. "Building a relationship of trust is vital with the youth so they are comfortable with representatives of law enforcement, with a strong emphasis on trusting the youth as well," concluded Skiles.

Juliaetta would benefit with a contract with the Sheriff's Department, is Skiles' opinion, stating that he knows some problems have moved there and the drug-related traffic likes towns without a dedicated law enforcement program, plus, people who insist on drinking to excess, then driving, will go to bars in town without regular patrols. He also speculated that Kendrick's establishments have lost many of those kinds of patrons. He also noted the bars in town have been quiet and not a problem, though he understands the bars feel they get too much attention. The same is true for drug traffic and other illegal activities: those that are heavily involved know what towns are free game and which ones are patrolled. This makes Juliaetta and other like communities a prime target for these kinds of activity.

Most importantly, Officer Skiles wants to serve the community in preserving safety for our families and maintaining our quality of life. He hopes to continue his contract with the Department for Kendrick for some time and has even turned down other opportunities. I would say we are lucky to have Officer

November Precipitation

No snow and not much rain was the report turned in the Gazette for November, 1997. Frank Dammarell records the rainfall for this area at his home on the SW section of Big Bear Ridge. Frank measured 2.3 inches of rain in the 30-day period this year, a little less than fell in the same month of 1996, when 3.7 inches was recorded.

Rain fell eight times last month, ranging from a slight .01 to an inch on the 20th.

Temperatures from from the lows of 20 degrees on the 14th and 15th to a high of 72 on the 4th.

Last year the area received 3.7 inches during 12 rainy days plus 11 inches of snow in two storms. The lows in November of 1996 ranged from 29 to 68 degrees.

Nell G. Crocker, 93, Retired Bank Teller, Passes Nov. 24

A memorial service for Nell G. Crocker, 93, a lifetime area resident and retired bank teller, will be held at 11 a. m. Thursday, Dec. 4 at 11 a. m. at Malcolm's Brower-Wann Chapel at Lewiston.

The Rev. Steve Taulbee of Lewiston will officiate. Cremation has taken place and a private family burial service will take place following the service at the Kendrick City Cemetery.

Nell died Nov. 24 of pneumonia at the Lewiston Rehabilitation and Care Center.

She was born Nov. 23, 1904, to Charles A. and Liddie Duntz Ameling on American Ridge near Kendrick. She grew up there and attended grade school on American Ridge. She attended the Ursuline Academy at Moscow and graduated from Kendrick High School in 1923.

She graduated from Northwestern Business College at Spokane in 1925.

She married Lester D. Crocker May 29, 1926, at Wallace, Idaho. The couple lived there until 1930, when they returned to the Kendrick area. She worked as a bank teller at the Farmers Bank at Kendrick, which later became the First Security Bank. She retired in 1971 after 28 years' service.

Her husband died in January 1981. She lived at Kendrick until moving to the Whispering Pines residential care center at Lewiston in June of 1995 and moved into the Lewiston Rehabilitation Center in January 1997.

She was a member of the Kendrick United Methodist Church and the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens at Kendrick. She was a 50-year life member of Canyon Chapter No. 87, Order of the Eastern Star at Kendrick, which later affiliated with the Laurel Chapter No. 13 at Lewiston. She had been past worthy matron and had served as the group's secretary for more than 25 years.

She liked camping in the Lochsa River country until her later years and was a charter member of the Kendrick Camper Klub. She also spent many hours crocheting afghans and making quilt covers.

She is survived by two sons, Dan E. Crocker of Novato, Calif., and David F. Crocker of Lawpai; four grandchildren, and 8 great-grandchildren.

Preceding her in death were a daughter, Eula Jean Crocker Johnson; one brother, and three sisters.
