## Heinen Infant Battles Heart Defect in Seattle Hospital

Tiny little Thomas Scott Heinen fights bravely for life in a Seattle hospital this week as medical teams worked to correct a congenital heart condition. Thomas Scott was born Wednesday afternoon, Dec. 3, at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center to Helen and Scott Heinen of Kendrick. Thomas had a normal delivery and all indications were he was doing well. However it was soon discovered that he had a serious heart problem and arrangements were made to transfer him to Children's Hospital in Seattle by airplane.

In Seattle specialists and further tests showed he had been born with Hypoplastic Heart Syndrome, a congenital condition. According to what the surgeons told Donna Heinen, what happens is the left side of the heart isn't functioning and the right is trying to do all the work of supplying blood to the body. It is a very complex condition. Surgery was the only option for the infant. He entered operating room at 7:30 Monday morning and the work was completed at about 3 o'clock that afternoon. He survived the operation well, but is listed as very critical, as of Tuesday morning shortly after 8 a. m. when Donna talked with the Gazette. Donna added that the doctors informed them the baby will need another operation in about 6 months, and another in 1 to 2 years. This surgery is a new procedure that was not developed until 1983.

Phil and Donna and Aaron and Diane and Selena all drove to Seattle Sunday. Also in Seattle with Helen and Scott are Merv and Pat Cooper, Helen's parents who had come to the U. S. to be with the family for the Holidays. Phil and Donna are expected to return to Kendrick on Wednesday.

## Heimgartner Confirmed by Senate For Rear Admiral

Captain Kenneth Heimgartner, U. S. Navy, and a native of Juliaetta, was one of only 34 captains throughout the Navy selected for promotion to Rear Admiral (lower Half) earlier this year.

The President forwarded the selectee's names to Congress in August, and the Senate confirmed the selection list on October 30.

A 1967 graduate of Kendrick High School and 1972 graduate of the University of Idaho, Captain Heimgartner is currently the executive assistant to Admiral T. Joseph Lopez, commander-in-chief of all U. S. naval forces in Europe and commander-in-chief of all NATO military forces in Southern Europe. He and his wife, the former Ida Glenn, of Kendrick, live in Naples, Italy.

Pastor Bob and Joyce Lambert of the Juliaetta Church of the Nazarene will host an open house Sunday, Dec. 14 from 5 to 8 o'clock at the church parsonage. A warm invitation is extended.

Captain Heimgartner, the son of Floyd and Betty Heimgartner of Juliaetta, joined the Navy in 1972 during the Vietnam War and received his Naval Flight Officer wings in 1973.

He spent the better part of his career as a Radar Intercept Officer, flying F-4 "Phantoms" and F-14 "Tomcats" off the deck of aircraft carriers. The captain has logged over 1,150 carrier deck landings and over 4,500 flight hours in fighter and attack aircraft.

He commanded an F-14 fighter squadron, a carrier air wing and has served two tours at the Pentagon in Washington, D. C. During his naval career, Heimgartner has flown off almost every one of the twelve aircraft carriers in the Navy's inventory, made port calls to coastal cities on every continent, and during the course of more than ten overseas deployments—each lasting six months or more—he has circumnavigated the globe.

Captain Heimgartner attributes his success in the Navy to his land-locked upbringing in northern Idaho. "Growing up in a small, closely-knit farming community and in the rugged environment of Idaho instilled within me a strong sense of patriotism, loyalty to something bigger than one's self, and a steadfast work ethic."

"My roots are still in Idaho, and when I can no longer contribute to our Navy and nation, my hope is to return to the Northwest and enjoy all the things I have spent my life defending," he remarked.

The captain said he has enjoyed his 25 years in the U. S. Navy. "I have particularly enjoyed the work environment and the people," Heimgartner noted. "The military is an organization that no matter what your background may be, if you work hard and contribute, there is a pay back—and you can go as high as you want or as far as your talents can take you."

"My parents have always been strong proponents and supporters of my Navy career. Both have had the opportunity to visit me at each one of the eight duty stations I have been assigned to in the continental U. S., and two of the three overseas assignments—Japan and Italy," said the appreciative son.

"However," he explained, "visiting me in Sarajevo, Bosnia-Herzegovina, while I was assigned to the Headquarters of the Peace Implementation Force (IFOR) was not an option!" (IFOR was directly supported by Captain Heimgartner's current command and under the charge of Admiral Lopez.

Proud parents themselves, Captain Heimgartner and Ida have three grown children living in U. S. Rachel resides in Alexander, Virginia and works in fashion merchandising; Audrey recently moved to New York City to pursue an art career; and Glenn is a second-year student at the University of Virginia at Charlottesville.

While I agree that a well-staffed and properly run facility, like the Boy's and Girl's Club in Lewiston, can be an asset to a community, I don't think we need one here in Kendrick. Unless such a place is funded sufficiently to support a trained staff and structured activities, it can quickly become a problem itself. Simply put: I don't think we as a community can afford to do it right, and to do it cheap could be worse than not doing it at all.

What can we do then? Well for one thing, we need to recognize that trouble begins at home for many young people. If Dad's not there and Mom doesn't care—kids will get into trouble of one kind or another. I think most of us can look back at our teenage years and remember how someone kept us on the straight and narrow when we needed guidance. That firm guiding hand is sadly missing from too many youngster's lives.

During the school year we have many activities for those who choose to participate: school sports, the various school sponsored clubs and groups, and of course everyone's favorite homework. In the summer-time we have our baseball leagues, the summer reading program at the Juliaetta Community Library, and quite a few summer job opportunities for those who want to work.

I have an idea for something we could do to provide another opportunity for worthwhile activity to our youth. Why don't we open the High School Library and Computer Room to the public for a few hours in the evening two or three days a week. The schedule could be coordinated with the Juliaetta Library, so one or the other would be open every weekday evening. The relatively small amount of funding needed could be provided from our existing recreation district to pay a librarian, and to reimburse the school district for the operating expenses incurred. We have a spacious library/computer room at our high school, and computers become obsolete long before they wear out, so let's put them to good use.
