REVELATION—LOVE

My words to you today is taken from the Apostle John, better known as "John the Beloved," because of his LOVE of Jesus.

Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love. This is how God showed His love among us: He sent His one and only Son into the world that we might live through Him. This is love: not that we loved God, but that He loved us and sent His Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins.

Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. If we love one another, God lives in us and His love is made complete in us. We know that we live in Him and He in us, because He has given us of His Spirit. If anyone acknowledges that Jesus is the Son of God, God lives in him and he in God. God is love. Who ever lives in loves lives in God, and God in him. I John 4:7-11, 12b-13 15, 16b, and Pastor Bob

And I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord and Giver of life, who proceedeth from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son together is worshipped and glorified; who spoke by the prophets.

Second History Fair, Workshop at Craigmont Jan. 10

True to their earlier commitment, Lewis-Clark College staff members Mary Emery and Carole Smolinski announce that a second history fair and workshop will be held at Craigmont on Saturday, January 10. Nancy Webster of Weippe, who is a student at LCSC, is once again providing logistical support and leadership in a regional effort to establish a newsletter devoted to familiarizing historians with the resources available in this area.

The fair and workshop are scheduled to kick off at 10:00 a. m. in the Community Center at Craigmont (the white brick building on the east end of Main Street near the viaduct), with check-in, set-up of displays and getting acquainted time set for 9:00 to 10:00. This get-together of those interested in preserving local history is part of an ongoing effort to build a network to support future regional projects that connect local history to other educational and community activities.

The morning session will concentrate on establishing a regional newsletter team. Points to be considered will include the following: Who will submit articles for the newsletter, who will edit it, and where it can be printed. Consideration will also have to be given to applying for a bulk mailing permit, managing the mailing list, collating, folding and labeling the newsletter for mailing.

Lunch will be provided at the center, with entertainment. Dave of Deary will perform "The Dutchman" on a 12-string guitar. Following lunch, Dick Southern will answer questions concerning researching homestead records in Nez Perce, Clearwater, Lewis, Idaho, and Latah counties. This session will be followed by an overview of the Illo-Vollmer Historical Society—how it was started and how its records are organized and stored. Time should also provide for some group discussion with other societies represented at the workshop. Adjournment is set for 3:00 p. m.

Mary Emery also indicates that the college is working with the Idaho Historical Society to set up a workshop on small museums and societies for March 13, 9:00 a. m. to noon. Kendrick-Juliaetta area residents with an interest in regional history are encouraged to consider attending either of these workshops.

Distance Learning Project Equipment For Local Schools

Kendrick — Distance Learning is closer to becoming a reality for schools serving TDS TELECOM customers, with the recent delivery and installation of new equipment at Troy and Kendrick High Schools. The new equipment is part of an eight-school system slated to be fully operative in June 1998. Project financing is provided by a federal and state grant, Lewis-Clark State College and contributions from corporation such as TDS TELECOM.

The complex system of video classrooms, digital video and audio, and high-speed telecommunications lines will provide simultaneous video, audio and data communications for both school and community use. Programs and schedules are in the development stage, but organizers predict the system will be a tremendous boost for curriculum development and sharing of resources between schools and among community groups.

Videoconferencing equipment installed at Kendrick High School is already in use for testing and system coordination. In addition to Kendrick and Troy High Schools, primary video sites are being established at Lapwai Junior/Senior High School, Orofino High School, Prairie High School in Cottonwood, Deary High school, Genesee Junior/Senior High School, and Potlatch Junior/Senior High School. All locations have Internet access and will be able to connect to video facilities located on the Lewis-Clark State College campus.

"Because of the advantages of using the digital switched phone network, the system we're building can accommodate more students than any of the fixed-circuit Distance learning networks in the state," said Kevin Carson, distance education coordinator for Lewis Clark State College, and grant administrator for the Distance Learning Alliance. "The initial use of the system will be for high school classes, especially subjects like foreign languages that an individual school may not be able to offer because enrollment is limited. With Distance Learning, students at multiple schools who are interested in a subject can be connected via video classroom.

"We're also looking at linking schools with college-level technical preparation courses that students can take for dual credit as well as academic college-credit courses," Carson continued. "Teacher and staff training is another ideal use of the system. In the future, we'll be developing community usage, such as EMT (emergency medical technician) training and town meetings with legislators, to name just two potential applications."

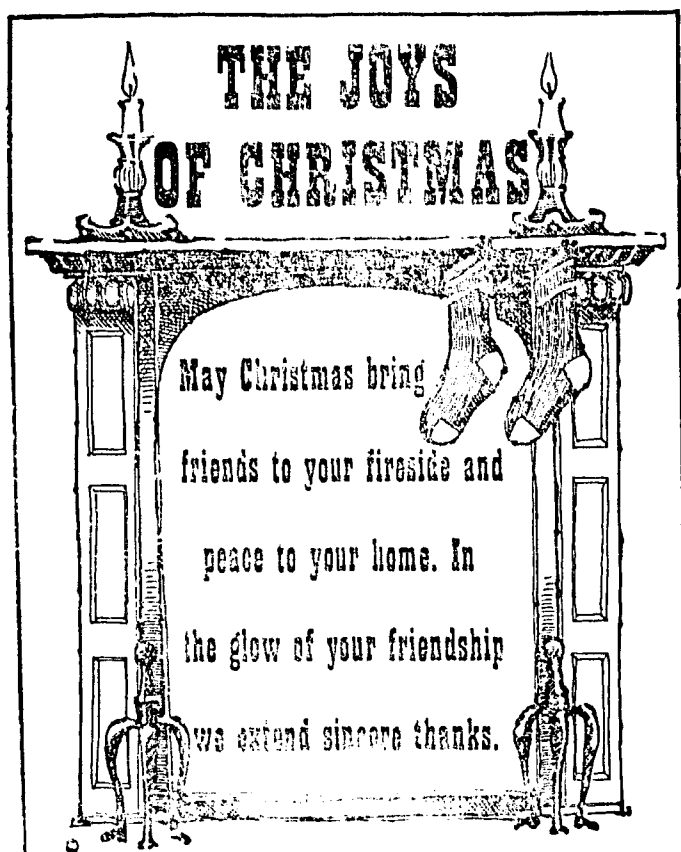
