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Thomas Scott Heinen Returned Home Sunday



With the combined blessing of modern medicine and the power of prayer, Thomas Scott Heinen, the 4-week old son of Scott and Helen Heinen was allowed to return to his home in Kendrick early Sunday morning following his release from Children's Hospital in Seattle, where he had been flown shortly after his birth on Dec. 3.

Little Thomas had been born with a heart condition Dec. 3. The condition was called Hypoplastic Heart Syndrome and his only hope for survival was surgery. His chances of survival of this was approximately 50-50, the doctors told the family.

His 5-hour surgery was performed Dec. 8, and despite some tense moments, he not only survived but thrived after the operation. The doctors told the family that Thomas responded to his surgery and treatment better than any infant they had ever treated. He was taken from intensive care and removed from his respirator early last week and he was able to have a feeding tube inserted so he could receive real nourishment. His response and recovery was so strong that he was released from the Hospital Saturday. Phil and Donna Heinen had gone over to Seattle on

Christmas Day to help bring him home. Phil and Donna and Scott and Helen and Thomas arrived back in Kendrick after midnight Dec. 28.

Scott said Thomas quickly settled into his new home and was being fed through the tube on a three-hour schedule. He rests comfortably and sleeps well. He does get a little edgy when he is bathed or changed. Scott says Thomas is scheduled for surgery again in four to six months and a third, and it is hoped, final operation is expected in 4 or 5 years.

Speaking for all involved, Scott said the Heinen family cannot express the deep gratitude due Thomas' medical team and especially to this community for the support and prayers they know helped save his life.

Scott and Helen would love to invite everyone in to see Thomas (he cause he truly is a beautiful baby), but the physicians have given strict instructions that they must keep him from possible contact with cold or flu germs. Grandpa and grandma Heinen are proudly displaying photos at the store and it is hoped that very soon he will be able to start visiting people.

New Hire Law Locates 600 Parents Who Owe Child Support

Children in more than 600 families began receiving child support payments these past two months thanks largely to a new law requiring employees to report all new hires. The law—which went into effect October 1, 1997—also is responsible for locating hundreds of others for whom child support enforcement orders still must be established.

"We knew the new law would work," said Shannon Barnes, who manages Health and Welfare's child support computer system. "But we didn't expect this kind of immediate result—hundreds of families who didn't get child support in October will receive support payments in November. That's tremendous."

Barnes is in charge of the Idaho Child Support Enforcement System, of ICSES, which compares new hire information collected by the Idaho Department of Labor with child support data held by Health and Welfare. When a "match" occurs for an existing support order, ICSES automatically prints out a wage withholding order that is mailed immediately to the employer. Employers forward the withheld money to the Health and Welfare staff, who then forward the payment to the appropriate family.

"This shows what an effective tool the new law is. In the past it could take up to six months to locate a parent who owes child support but doesn't want to pay it," Barnes said.

The law requires all employers to notify the Department of Labor of all new employees within 20 days of their hire date. Just over 2,000 employers reported 11,678 new hires in October, said Dwight Johnson, spokesman for the Department of Labor.

"This new law means more work for employers, but they have been very responsive," Johnson said. "Obviously, they want to do their part to help Idaho's children."

Six Rural Partners Form Cluster To Submit Kellogg Grant Application

Six communities in North Central Idaho on December 30 submitted an application to the Kellogg Foundation to be named one of five rural clusters in the nation to develop the use of electronic communications to improve a community's ability to launch and carry out projects. Those Rural Partners seeking to become part of the MIRA project (Managing Information in Rural Areas) are Bovill, Kendrick-Julietta, the Nez Perce Tribe, Pierce, Troy, and Weippe.

Representatives of these communities were first made aware of the grant possibility back on November

3 and met with Dr. Mary Emery of Lewis-Clark State College three times to develop an understanding of the project's purpose and requirements. Following a meeting on November 17, representatives of each of the communities went home to develop answers to a series of questions concerning how they would create new partnerships and cross boundaries as members of a MIRA cluster. Their answers were then submitted to Emery at LCSC's Institute for Community Development by e-mail, FAX, and telephone, and she in turn drafted a consolidated narrative statement to be included in the formal application. Following final editing of the narrative, the application was sent off on Dec. 30.

Responding to the challenge to create new partnerships, the Kendrick-Julietta Community Development Association welcomed the Julietta Elementary School PTO (Parent Teacher Organization) as a participant in this latest approach to regional planning and problem solving. The leadership of the PTO and K-JCDA's Lil Howerton deserve much credit for facing the challenges of this grant possibility, which could see up to \$15,000 provided to buy electronic equipment and services to improve communication within the Kendrick-Julietta community, which in turn would benefit the region as a whole.

All of the communities involved agree that they have an interest in community building. "Force us to think about people on the fringe," they write, "to tear down walls and include those always missing; to open doors to the community... We have," they add, "older communities who need to invest the younger people in the future of the community to preserve it." And they conclude, "We need a model for planning instead of dealing with consequences when we could have done prevention."

These statements are, in a way, diagnostic. They point the way forward toward a different kind of planning than we have generally seen in the past. Which is to take nothing away from the good that has accrued from past efforts, even though they perhaps did represent at times a narrow focus of interest and therefore energy. The Kellogg MIRA project holds forth the hope and promise of a broader involvement of a community's citizens in the launching of new projects and in their management.

The most significant boundary-stretching identified in the grant application focuses on the need to create better relationships between the geographically-based communities and the Nez Perce Tribal community. The grant applicants state that in an era of increasing racial tensions, "we have a pressing need to help each other learn how to do that." The Nez Perce Tribe representative writes that the approach of crossing boundaries is a novel idea for the Tribe. "For the first time," the narrative states, "the Tribe will be building strong community ties to look at problems that exist and ways to work together as a team to solve these problems."

This, too, suggests a diagnostic point of view—toward where we have been as people and where we can choose to go in the future. The next phase of the project is to get organized and seek out possible additional partners in North Central Idaho to become part of the cluster. Clusters may include six to ten communities. The most challenging task will be to line up a pool of volunteers in each community who will be willing to attend one or more of six workshops, the content of which will be designed by the cluster. Failure to have at least ten members present at each workshop will disqualify a community from the possibility of receiving the \$15,000 grant identified earlier in this story.

Arthritis, Muscle Pain Call for Different Remedies

All over-the-counter pain relievers aren't equal, says a Stanford rheumatologist, who recommends acetaminophen for "wear and tear" arthritis without a lot of inflammation, and suggests other pain relievers, including aspirin, for sore muscles, mild sprains and general overuse from exercise.

"Aspirin, ibuprofen and acetaminophen all work well for most people with minor arthritis pain and all are fine if taken occasionally. But common pain relievers other than acetaminophen (Tylenol and generic equivalents) may not be a good idea for regular and sustained therapy," says Dr. Edward D. Harris, Stanford's George DeForest Barnett Professor of Medicine and author of a definitive textbook on rheumatoid arthritis.

"The problem is that we have some good evidence that the traditional nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (such as aspirin) may interfere with the normal metabolism (function) of cartilage, the very tissue we want to protect," he says.

"On the other hand, if your problem is muscle pain from exercise, then aspirin, ibuprofen or related formulas may be the better choice," says Harris. That's because these nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs help reduce swelling in the muscles and joints. Acetaminophen will relieve the pain, but it doesn't have any therapeutic value to reduce swelling.

Harris also notes that ice applied to the sore muscle within the first four hours after pain-causing exercise works very well with acetaminophen.

He adds that arthritis, unlike strained muscles from work or sports, may require some long-range strategies that are best managed with professional assistance and possibly a stronger medication.

The rheumatologist notes that nonprescription painkillers, including acetaminophen and aspirin, are far less potent in their over-the-counter versions than in formulas available by prescription.

"And even if your pain is minor and infrequent, always mention joint or muscle discomfort to your physician during an annual physical.

Be Care Around Snow Removal Equipment

Motorists can increase their safety this winter by taking precautions when driving near snow equipment. Snowplow blades forcing snow up and off the road can cause blizzard-like or reduced-visibility conditions for drivers following too closely.

Caution and cooperation are the keys to snow removal safety. Drivers can help increase safety by remembering the following tips:

- ◆ Remain at least two car lengths behind snowplow trucks for every 10 mph of your vehicle's speed. Abrasives being spread by these trucks can damage your vehicle. Snow from the road can spray out, reducing visibility.

- ◆ Do not pass a snow removal vehicle unless absolutely necessary. If you must pass, do not pass through the plume coming off plow, and pass only when you can clearly see the road ahead. Be patient if cars are stacking behind a snow removal vehicle. The snowplow operator will let you pass when it is safe.

- ◆ Do not cut back immediately in front of a snowplow truck; the snowplow blades are often covered with snow and can be difficult to see. The plow extends as much as 30 inches beyond the truck width.

- ◆ Do not brake suddenly in front of a snow plow. The heavy vehicle cannot stop as quickly as a passenger vehicle.

- ◆ Expect to see snow removal equipment in action during a storm. Snowplows are continually clearing the streets and highways to provide the best possible traction, so be on the lookout for them.

- ◆ Do not abandon your vehicle unless absolutely necessary. However, if you must, leave it as far off the road as possible. Abandoned vehicles, which may be buried or hidden by snow, can greatly hamper snow removal efforts, can be extremely hazardous to snow removal equipment

and operators, and can result in damage to the abandoned vehicle.

- ◆ Do not rely on snow removal vehicles to lead you down the street or highway. Some drivers follow snow removal vehicles so closely they do not realize when they are turning around or crossing a median.

- ◆ Slow down when approaching a snowplow truck. Snowplows travel under the speed limit while clearing the roads. Some accidents have occurred when motorists hit the snowplow truck from the rear.

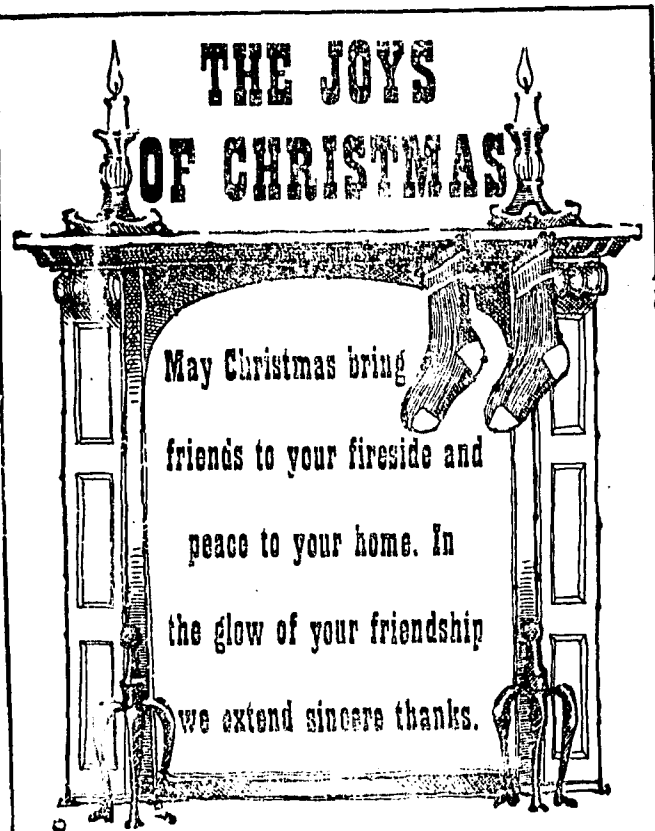
