Clearwater County Board Votes to Lease CV Hospital, Clinics to Benedictine System

Orofino—The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners voted affirmatively (3 to 0) to enter into a facilities lease agreement with Clearwater Valley Hospital & Clinics and the Benedictine Health System (BHS) of Duluth, Minn.

Under the agreement, the Benedictine Health System will lease the hospital and clinics from the County and bring its expertise in health care management to the organization. BHS will also bring the broad resources of its health care system to develop and integrated delivery system and enhance the quality of care provided to the Clearwater Valley and Camas Prairie region.

Final documents will be signed later in January with BHS expected to assume operations of Clearwater Valley Hospital and Clinics on Feb. 1, 1998.

"We are truly excited about this new affiliation for our hospital," said Earl Pickett, Chair, Clearwater County Board of Commissioners, "BHS has the management expertise and resources that we need for the Hospital to be competitive in the future."

Rural Partners to Meet at LCSC on Jan. 12 To Discuss Variety of Topics

Rural Partners will be meeting in Room 207 of the Student Union Building at Lewis-Clark State College this coming Monday, January 12. With registration and refreshments scheduled for 9:00 a. m., the meeting gets under way at 9:30 and will be led by Don Heath, chairman of the Clearwater RC&D's rural development committee. Involvement of the Clearwater Resource Conservation and Development Council illustrates how Rural Partners has grown to be more than a coalition of Gem Community teams. Currently government agencies and others with an interest in rural development are involved in the deliberations. It's called crossing boundaries and is symptomatic of a new day in development efforts.

The session will begin with the usual reports from communities and organizations, followed by a Community Leaders Forum led by Dr. Mary Emery of LCSC and Bob Ford of the Idaho Department of Commerce. Following lunch (for which there is an \$8 fee), the agenda includes three substantial topics for discussion, beginning with implications for communities of the Lewis and Clark Bicentennial celebration. Sue Hottolis and Dodd Snodgrass, CEDA's representative, will lead the discussion.

Then Malcolm Dell, coordinator for Central Idaho Woodnet, will report on his group's upcoming workshop. And finally, David Holland, Department of Agricultural Economics at WSU, will lead a discussion of energy deregulation issues and present economic impact examples from a Washington study.

News of the successful completion of the application for a Kellogg Foundation MIRA grant will also gain some attention. Kendrick-Juliaetta is one of six Rural Partners who have crossed boundaries to establish a regional cluster. Some report on the History Fair and Workshop at Craigmont this Saturday can be expected as well.

Not Much Moisture In December

December of 1997 will be remembered as a dry month, according to the figures recorded by Frank Dammarell, who lives on the lower South West side of Big Bear Ridge and by Dave Morgan who has his rain gauge at his home on Schoolhouse Hill in Kendrick. Dammarell reports that there was .09 inches for the 31 days of December. Morgan reported 1.8 inches of rain for the same period. Dammarell also tracked the snow, which he recorded at 15 inches, falling on six different days.

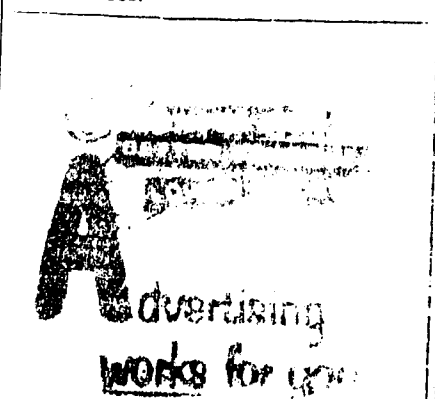

Travel, Economic Advisory Councils Meet to Discuss Idaho Issues

A joint session between the two
private-industry councils responsible
for overseeing the Idaho Department
of Commerce is being held this week.

in Boise. The session will be held in
conjunction with each council's regu-
larly scheduled meeting and will
focus on issues facing various areas
in Idaho.

During the half-day session, both
councils will hear reports on inter-
national trade activity, Idaho's work-
force Development Training Fund
and the state's 2002 Olympic strategy.

The Idaho Travel Council will
meet separately with the Idaho Out-
fitters and Guides Association on
January 7 at the Doubletree Hotel
Riverside in Garden City. The joint
session between both councils will
be held in the East Conference Room
of the Joe. R. Williams Building in
the morning of January 8. The Idaho
Economic Advisory Council will then
re-convene independently on Janu-
ary 9 in Conference Rooms A and B
of the Idaho Department of Com-
merce.

Reports on cooperative advertising
campaigns, the Idaho Travel Coun-
cil Convention and Grant program,
the 1998 Idaho Travel Guide, the
state's winter marketing campaign
and the upcoming North American
Ski Journalists Association Con-
vention will be made to the Idaho
Travel Council.

The Idaho Economic Advisory
Council will review 27 requests from
Idaho cities and counties for public
facility projects totaling \$10.6 mil-
lion as well as grant requests from
the City of Caldwell and the City
of Kellogg. Caldwell hopes to use a
\$342,350 economic development grant
for water and street improve-
ments necessary for construction of
a new Flying J Truckstop. Kellogg
wishes to use a \$70,000 imminent
threat grant to purchase and re-
move a house damaged during last
winter's floods.

Idaho community leaders serving
on the Economic Advisory Council
include: Dana Magnuson, chairman,
Kendrick; Paul Anderson, Post
Falls; Gary Mahn, Boise; Con Paul-
os, Jerome; Jack Shaver, Pocatello;
and Clay Condit, Arco.

Appointments to the council are
made by Governor Phillip Batt.

I am often asked to describe the experience of raising a
child with an illness—try to help people who have not
shared that unique experience to understand, to imagine
how it would feel. It's like this . . .

When you're going to have a baby, it's a bit like planning
a fabulous holiday—to Italy. You buy lots of guidebooks
and make your wonderful plans: the Coliseum, the
Michelangelo David, the gondolas in Venice. You may
even learn some handy phrases in Italian.

It's all very exciting.

After months of eager anticipation, the day finally
arrives, you pack your bags and off you go. Several
hours later the plane lands. The stewardess comes in
and says, "Welcome to Holland."

"HOLLAND?" you say, "What do you mean, Holland? I
signed up for Italy! I'm supposed to be in Italy! All my
life I've dreamed of going to Italy!"

But there's been a change in the flight plan. They've
landed in Holland, and there you must stay.

The important thing to remember is they haven't
taken you to a horrible, disgusting, filthy place, full of
pestilence, famine and disease. It's just a different place.
So you must go out and buy new guidebooks. And you
must learn a whole new language. And you will meet a
whole new group of people you would have never met.
It's just a different place. It's slower paced than Italy,
less flashy than Italy. But after you've been there for a
while and you catch your breath, you can look around,
and you begin to notice that Holland has windmills,
Holland has tulips, Holland even has Rembrandts.
But everyone you know is busy coming and going from
Italy, and they're boasting about what a wonderful time
they had there. And for the rest of your life, you will

the loss of that dream is a very significant loss.

But if you spend your life mourning the fact that you
didn't get to Italy, you may never be free to enjoy the
very special, the very lovely things about Holland.

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
