

Carolyn Brown, Juliaetta Businesswoman, Civic Leader, Claimed by Cancer Jan. 11

Carolyn Brown, a respected Juliaetta businesswoman, civic leader and home maker lost her lengthy, gallant battle against cancer and died in Pullman Memorial Hospital Sunday morning, Jan. 11, 1998.

Carolyn was a well-known and respected member of the community and many projects and events were made better because of her hard work, her intelligence and dedication. She was active in community, 4-H, church and business affairs. She was one of the driving forces in the creation and success of the Juliaetta Centennial Park.



She was born Dec. 24, 1941, in Indianapolis, Indiana to Orville E. and Olean Pruitt Skaggs. She attended school in Indiana until she moved to a ranch above Kendrick in 1954. She graduated from Kendrick High School in 1959, and she married Jack Brown December 5, 1959 at Juliaetta. During her early married years, she lived in the Northwest as Jack worked in construction. In 1968 Carolyn and Jack moved back to Juliaetta where he operates his own excavating and contracting business. The family has lived in Juliaetta since that time.

She was a member of the Southwick Community Church and was a devoted 4-H leader for 7 years. In the 1980s she owned and operated the Little Brown Jug Antiques in Juliaetta, established Granny's Pantry and Bakery Restaurant in that town and then owned and operated a gift shop, also in Juliaetta. Carolyn was one of the reasons the Juliaetta Centennial Celebration was such a success in 1992 and after the celebration was over she worked hard to keep its spirit alive with the Juliaetta Centennial Park, which is already the pride of the communities of both Juliaetta and Kendrick.

Her hobbies included horse shows, gardening, cooking and collecting antiques and glassware.

Survivors include her husband, Jack at the family home; two daughters, Lori Brocke of Kendrick and Anna Brown of Juliaetta; her mother and stepfather, Olean and John Cuddy of Kendrick; three sisters, Jean Jordan of Pendleton, Ore., Patsy Christensen of Yakima and Judy Clark of Moses Lake, Wash.; two brothers, Joe Cuddy of Anchorage, Alaska, and Terry Skaggs of Desert Hot Springs, Calif.; and two grandchildren, Alecia and Amber Brocke of Kendrick.

She was preceded in death by her father Orville E. Skaggs.

Viewing for Carolyn will be Wednesday and Thursday from 10 a. m. to 7 p. m. at Malcom's Brower-Wann Chapel in Lewiston. Her funeral will be Friday at 1 p. m. at Orchards Community Church at 822 Bryden in Lewiston. Burial will be at the Juliaetta Cemetery.

Family and friends are invited to a dinner at the Kendrick V. F. W. Hall following the services.

Thanksgiving Day Hunting Incident Ruled Justifiable Homicide

Issued by Latah County Prosecuting Attorney and the Latah County Sheriff's Office

Shortly before 8:00 a. m. on Thursday, November 27, 1997, deputies of the Latah County Sheriff's Office responded to the report of a shooting occurring in the Tamarack Ridge area of southeastern Latah County. At 9:00 a. m. on the same day, Michael K. McQueen, 44, was pronounced dead. Subsequent investigation, including an autopsy performed by Dr. Morgan S. Wilson, M. D., determined cause of death as a single gunshot from a high powered rifle.

Subsequent investigation by the Latah County Sheriff's Office, the Idaho Criminal Investigation Bureau and the Latah County Prosecuting Attorney's Office, revealed the following:

On the morning of November 27, 1997, Donald K. Cooper, 53, a resident of the Southwick area, and his

The family suggests memorials be made to the Kendrick-Juliaetta Ambulance Fund.

Services are under the direction of Short's Funeral Chapel, Moscow.

son, Corey D. Cooper, 32, were hunting on foot in the Tamarack Ridge area of southeastern Latah County. The Coopers had split up with Donald Cooper walking on a logging road and Corey Cooper moving up hill to walk through the brush on a neighboring ridge.

After the Coopers had separated, Michael McQueen and his brother, William Patrick McQueen, 49, headed up the same road riding four-wheelers. As they drove along the road, they encountered Don Cooper. Michael McQueen was in the lead and slowed as he passed Mr. Cooper. Mr. Cooper commented to Michael McQueen about his (Cooper's) disapproval of four-wheelers in the area.

Michael McQueen's brother, Patrick, stopped and talked with Don Cooper. The conversation again related to the propriety of four-wheelers being used for hunting in this area. Patrick McQueen then proceeded to follow his brother on up the road.

After the McQueens left, Donald Cooper discharged his hunting rifle two times into the brush below the road. (This was a signal used to tell his son, Corey, to join him.) When Corey arrived, Don Cooper told him of the encounter with the four-wheelers and the Coopers started walking back up the road.

In the meantime, the McQueen brothers had proceeded further along the road and around a small finger ridge. When they stopped to watch a clearing, they heard a series of six gunshots which appeared to be directed at them and coming from the direction of the ridge above. The source of these shots has not been established. Based on the description provided by Patrick McQueen, these rounds were most likely fired from a pistol or low caliber rifle as opposed to a high caliber hunting rifle.

Alarmed by the shots so near them, the McQueens decided to return to the main road and proceeded back down the private road. As they were driving out, they came up behind the Coopers who were walking in the same direction. Again, Michael McQueen was in the lead with his brother, Patrick, following.

As the McQueens approached, the Coopers turned toward them. Each of the Coopers was carrying a hunting rifle. Each of the McQueens had a hunting rifle in the handlebar racks of the four-wheelers. Michael also had a .32 caliber pistol in a holster around his waist. As the Coopers were turning toward the McQueens, Michael McQueen drew his pistol and pointed it in the direction of the two men. Both of the Coopers and Patrick McQueen told investigators that they believed Michael McQueen discharged a round from his pistol. In response to this, Corey Cooper fired a single round from his hunting rifle, a Remington Model 700 .338 Winchester Magnum. Investigation confirmed that the bullet from Corey Cooper's rifle clipped the forend of the stock of Michael McQueen's rifle as it rested in the handlebars of the four-wheeler and then struck Michael McQueen in the upper right abdomen.

Patrick McQueen went to the aid of his brother and allowed the Coopers to use his, Patrick McQueen's four-wheeler to retrieve Corey Cooper's pickup truck which was further down the road. On the way back to the scene of the shooting, the Coopers called for an ambulance on their cell phone. Patrick McQueen and Donald Cooper attempted to give CPR to Michael McQueen in the bed of the pickup truck while Corey drove them to meet the ambulance. Kendrick-Juliaetta ambulance EMT's transported Michael to rendezvous with a Med Star helicopter. Michael McQueen was declared dead at approximately 9:00 a. m.

Based on the investigation reports; interviews with Donald Cooper, Corey Cooper, and Patrick McQueen; the autopsy report; and the other evidence gathered during the course of this investigation, the Latah County Prosecuting Attorney has determined that this tragic incident is a justifiable homicide under the provisions of Idaho Code 18-4009. As a result of this determination, no criminal charges will be pursued.

Based on the investigation reports; interviews with Donald Cooper, Corey Cooper, and Patrick McQueen; the autopsy report; and the other evidence gathered during the course of this investigation, the Latah County Prosecuting Attorney has determined that this tragic incident is a justifiable homicide under the provisions of Idaho Code 18-4009. A Good Neighbor . . .

Every year around Christmas we usually buy a big block of cheese, bake some cookies, and head up the hill to Southwick. These items are Christmas treats for a dear old friend of ours. (He told us he likes cheese better than candy.) His name is Emil Byer. During the twenty years that we lived and farmed at Southwick, Emil was our neighbor and handy-man. And "Handy" is the proper name for him. He spent many days and weeks of working for us at various times. With John's help he transformed our old house into a pleasant, comfortable home. He also helped us build a big shop. There are very few homes in the Cavendish-Southwick area that Emil did not remodel or repair. His asking hourly wage was very small, but he did request a noon meal, which was gladly supplied. There was no job too small, menial or hopeless for him to tackle, jobs that most carpenters would have turned down. He was expert at sharpening saws, too. Emil had a "waiting list" of people needing his help. He does not drink, smoke or swear, and is always pleasant to be around.

We would said, "Emil, you should charge more." His reply, "No, I'm doing all right and I like to help my neighbors."

He could take old crooked boards and transform them into something lasting and useful. He wasted nothing. When he finished a job you could often pick up the scraps in your two hands. He had few tools, but they were well-cared for.

In haying season he did custom mowing and baling. He plowed small garden patches for neighbors. He was handy with masonry work, and constructed chimneys and attractive fireplaces. One summer he came to my rescue when I broke my leg, and he drove my trucks through harvest time.

Emil and his wife Verla, for the most part, raised all their own food—a big garden and orchard, chickens, a milk cow, and their own meat. What they couldn't use they shared with others. She did all their baking and preserved the garden and orchard produce. This was all done on her wood cook stove. It was a treat to step into their cool cellar and breathe in the delicious aroma. Bins of apples, squash, potatoes and cabbages lined the walls, along with many jars of canned fruits, vegetables, pickles and jelly. They had no telephone.

Emil, of German descent, grew up in Wassau, Wisconsin, in a large family of brothers and sisters. The family went through some very hard times. He served in the Army in World War II. He suffered with arthritis from the severely cold winters there. He first came to Plummer, Idaho, and spent a year with his uncle. He then worked as a janitor for the Moscow School District, met his wife Verla, got married, and they moved to her 40-acre farm at Southwick. After building their new house, he had time to spare and started doing carpenter work in the area. Let me say here that when he was "on a job" (you'd better be out of bed early. He didn't hold with sleeping late. His motto: "Early to bed, and early to rise.")

Verla passed away in 1987, and Emil retired soon after that when

Fifty-two people from North Central Idaho braved icy roads last Saturday to attend the History Fair and Workshop at Craigmont. According to an on-hand report from Nancy Webster of Weippe, those attending were a lively bunch, dedicated to preserving the history that some think our region is fast losing.

Many brought displays of their individual and group projects. The day's presenters used creative, humorous, and dramatic methods to convey information, blending entertainment with education. Those who came were grandly entertained by the Illo-Volmer Historical Society and the presenters scheduled on the agenda. Initial steps were taken to begin production of a regional history newsletter. Activities for the day were coordinated by Shelley Kuther, the society's president.

The event was the second activity of the Idaho Humanities Council sponsored series, "Preserving the Past to Create the Future," a project directed by Dr. Mary Emery of the Institute for Community Development at Lewis-Clark State College and intended to increase local and family history preservation throughout the five county area of North Central Idaho.

During the morning session, Emery facilitated organizing the newsletter production team and establishing its content objectives and distribution. Donna Turnipseed was chosen as editor, and newsletter team members include Shelley Kuther, Dave Lewis, Margaret Rourke, Lillian Pethtol, and Carmeleta Spencer. In addition, Mary Emery, Mike Tat-

ko of the Lewiston Morning Tribune, Pat Eck, and Jamie Edmundson agreed to get a Web page developed for electronic publication so that local history will ride on the wave of the future.

The newsletter team has indicated that information concerning subscribing will be included in the first four-page edition, to be mailed in May. Each submission to the editor will become part of an historic collection. Those who submit articles, queries and other information for publication will be added to the mailing list.
