## Central Idaho Woodnet: Economic Diversification Principles in Action

In its Gem Community program, the Idaho Department of Commerce has consistently promoted the principle of economic diversification as one means of offsetting the decline of agriculture and the forest products industry in the economy of North Central Idaho. Early on, Gem teams were encouraged to identify those ways in which their community could diversify its economy. That is, find new and innovative ways to add to its economic bucket. In Kendrick-Juliaetta, an attempt to attract retirees—and their retirement incomes—to North Central Idaho was frustrated by the lack of adequate housing in the region.

The attempt to deal with the housing problem ran up against the economics of the market place and lack

of interest on the part of potential investors. And the attempt to diversify the economy by attracting tourists did not appear to have sufficient support within the community. Given those frustrated attempts, the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association for all practical purposes abandoned any effort itself to establish and promote economic diversification as a strategy to improve the economy of our community.

Meanwhile, individuals associated with the forest products industry and economic development began to put together a regional diversification strategy and established a flexible network of small and medium-sized companies that make things from wood or special forest products, or otherwise make a living in forest-related industries. To their credit, the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association—and Phyllis Berg specifically—promoted that effort in sponsoring the area's first Woodcraft Festival and Exhibition in Kendrick's city park on a rainy weekend back in late September. (See the Kendrick Gazette for Oct. 2, 1997.)

According to Malcolm Dell, Coordinator for Central Idaho Woodnet, members work together to share information and resources, at the same time creating opportunities that make each of them more successful. Although most members come from the five counties of North Central Idaho and surrounding states and counties, some are from as far away as Birmingham, Alabama. In the language of MIRA—managing information in rural America—that's a lot of boundary crossing indeed! Not to mention lots of new partnerships.

Those who ventured out to visit last September's cold and wet Woodcraft Festival had a chance to see one of the four Woodnet programs in operation—the one identified as a composite woodcrafts, furniture & Toy Guild. This program was designed to help small, high-quality woodshop businesses increase profits and/or grow to any size they want. All operate on the value-added principle (central to economic diversification theory). In this case, raw products from the forestry industry are increased in value as woodcrafters turn them into a variety of items, some of which were on display and for sale in the city park. Central Idaho Woodnet also provides training for the craftsmen in product pricing, financing growth, working with wood, devising business plans, bookkeeping, and—why not!—the Internet. It also assists them in marketing their products.

Here is economic diversification at work. In a future story, we'll take a look at three other programs of Central Idaho Woodnet: Its mobile sawmill network/specialty lumber yard. Its urban/community forest and hardwood marketing co-op. And cooperative manufacturing and the virtual incubator. All in all, this is a venture that has involved folks sitting down together and, through planning, turning economic frustrations into opportunities. In terms of process, it is something that local community development leaders could well take a serious look at!

## Sandra Day O'Connor, Supreme Court Justice, To Speak at UI Feb. 10

United States Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor will present a public lecture at 4:30 p. m., Feb. 10, in the UI Student Union Ballroom. O'Connor's visit is sponsored by the UI College of Law and its Bellwood Lectures program. Justice O'Connor was nominated to the U. S. Supreme Court by former President Ronald Reagan on July 7, 1981, and was confirmed by the U. S. Senate on Sept. 22 of that year. She took the oath of office on Sept. 25 to become the first woman U. S. Supreme Court Justice.

Her Feb. 10 lecture is free and open to the public, and a reception at the SUB will follow. Doors to the ballroom will open at 3:30 p. m. Those wishing to attend are encouraged to arrive early as seating is limited. There will be overflow seating and a simultaneous videocast of O'Connor's lecture in the Borah Theatre and possibly the Galena Silver and Gold Rooms.

Some metered parking spaces near the SUB will be closed for the event, but portions of lots 18 and 29 will remain open.

As a consideration to Justice O'Connor, the College of Law requests that no flash pictures be taken after she begins to speak, and that no still or video pictures be taken after the first three minutes of her presentation.

O'Connor is the second Bellwood Lecture, a program funded by a \$1 million gift from Judge Sherman J. Bellwood, the largest endowed lectureship at the UI. Bellwood was a 1939 UI graduate who received his law degree from the University of Michigan in 1941. After serving in World War II, Bellwood returned to Idaho and began the practice of law, serving as a private attorney, county prosecutor and district court judge. He retired in 1981.

She grew up in Woodlan, Idaho, graduated from Walla Walla High School in Washington, and attended Lewiston State Normal School (now LC SC) in Lewiston, and taught school in several country schools until she married Clifford Powell Aug. 13, 1919, at the Juliaetta home of her parents, Edward and Laura Gallaher.

The Powells farmed at Leland, Cream Ridge, and Lenore, and finally in 1945, bought a farm near Spalding, Idaho. Through her years, she has been an active member of the United Brethren and Cottonwood Creek Community churches, holding various offices. She was also active in the Spalding and Kendrick communities. She loved to read, hook rugs, piece quilts, and grow flowers. Glaucoma and a series of eye surgeries have curtailed all of these activities.

Living members of her family include daughters Marjorie Stevens of Juliaetta, Idaho, and Carol Glass of Boise; grandchildren Linda Van Dellen of Sandpoint, Tom Glass of Idaho City, Idaho, and Bill Glass of Junction City, Oregon; seven great-grandchildren, and one great-great-granddaughter.
