The Importance of Vision In Strategic Planning

This flexible manufacturing network traces its roots to the Idapine mill closure of November, 1994. Faced with a regional economic crisis, Grangeville's Gem team, with help from the Clearwater Economic Development Association, acquired EDA funds to design a long-term, comprehensive development plan for all of Idaho County. Grangeville Economic Management obviously had its attention focused on something much bigger than a few infrastructure improvement projects and far beyond the boundaries of Grangeville itself. Effie Powell, 99, Longtime Area Resident Passes

Effie L. Powell, 99, a recent Lewiston resident and former longtime resident of the Kendrick area, died of causes related to age Wednesday, Feb. 4, 1998, five days short of her 100th birthday, at Sun River Manor in Lewiston.

She was born Feb. 9, 1898, to Edward and Laura Calvert Gallaher near Spokane.

She married Clifford P. Powell Aug. 31, 1919, at her parents home in Juliaetta. He died March 9, 1965.

She graduated from Walla Walla High School in 1916 and attended Lewis-Clark Normal School.

She taught in several country schools prior to her marriage.

She farmed with her husband at Leland, Cream Ridge and Lenore and in 1945 bought a farm near Spalding. After his death she moved to Clarkston. She cared for her sister-in-law and other shut-ins in their homes. She spent 16 years in Kendrick as a companion to Martha Wilken.

She enjoyed growing flowers and prided herself at being able to identify all wild flowers. She enjoyed quilting, hooking rugs and Scrabble.

She was active in the Juliaetta and Kendrick communities. She was a charter member of the Cottonwood Creek Community Church.

She is survived by two daughters, Marjorie Stevens of Juliaetta and Carol Glass of Boise; three grandchildren; seven great-grandchildren; and one great-great-grandchild.

She was preceded in death by a granddaughter and 12 brothers and sisters.

Her funeral was at 2 p. m. Saturday at Cottonwood Creek Community Church with the Rev. Frank Campbell of the Cottonwood Creek Community Church officiating. Burial was at Sunnyside Cemetery near Lenore.

NRA Announces Winners In Annual Art Contest

Fifteen youthful artists share in the prizes awarded to winners in the NRA's Tenth Annual Youth Wildlife Art Contest. This year's winners come from all across the United States; from Oregon and California, from Iowa and Louisiana, from Connecticut and Pennsylvania. They range in age from seven years to 18 and from second graders to seniors in high school and include Abigail Gutting, the thirteen-year-old daughter of Dr. Randall and Susan Gutting of Kendrick.

"The choices keep getting harder to make," said Harry Jaacks, chief judge for the contest. "Every year I find more mastery of medium and perfection of technique on the part of these young artists. It's really pleasant to see."

The contest entries are grouped into categories according to school grade level: Grades 1 to 3, 4 to 6, 7 to 9, and 10 to 12. Contestants submit drawings of animals that may be legally hunted or trapped in North America. Typical subjects of the youthful artists' work include deer (by far the most popular), bear, waterfowl, and upland game birds. This year, furbearing animals got their share of attention with prizes going for portrayals of a raccoon and of a bobcat. First place winners in each category receive a \$300 cash prize.

"We wish all the entrants could win," said John Robbins, manager of the NRA's Youth Programs Department and another of the judges. "But, win or not every entrant can be proud of having made the effort." Abigail's younger brother, Caleb, was also an entrant.

The children come by their interest in both animals and art naturally. Their father Dr. Randy Gutting owns and operates Seven Ridges Veterinary in Kendrick, and Abigail and Caleb's mother, Susan, teaches art classes and assists at the animal clinic.

Community has Opportunity for Grant-Writing Workshop if Enough are Interested

It is what Kendrick city council member Lillian Howerton termed, "an opportunity we can't turn down"—an opportunity to have a one-day grant writing workshop in Kendrick and Juliaetta, if enough interest is shown by local non-profit groups, clubs, civic organizations and citizens. Private Forest Landowner Workshops in Moscow

"Forest Stewardship Management: New and Unique Opportunities" is the theme of a two-day workshop for the private forest landowner scheduled for March 23-24 in Moscow. It will be at the University Inn Best Western. The eighth such workshop since 1991, it is sponsored by the Clearwater Resource Conservation and Development Council, Inc. and affiliate groups. The Idaho Forest Owners Association and Idaho Tree Farm Program 1998 Annual Meetings are being held in conjunction with the workshop.

The workshop will be comprised of four main sessions: Landowner Successes and Land Use Policy—Rachel Jordan, 1996 National Outstanding Tree Farmer of the Year from Dodgeville, Wisconsin will be the featured keynote speaker at the beginning of the session describing the successes and failures she and husband Don have

experienced in the many years of private forest land management leading up to their distinguished national award. USDA Forest Service personnel from national headquarters will discuss non-industrial private forest (NIPF) landownership and NIPF success stories from the Northeastern U. S. There will also be a presentation on forest land use policy decisions and effects on NIPF owners.

Unique Forest Management Operations—A variety of presentations by private landowners and land managers will address managing the forest for sustainability and profit, supplementing the ranch with tree farming and the experiences of a high school class in managing a section of commercial forest land.

The Safety Issue—This session will focus on various topics ranging from legal issues and landowner liability to personal safety. Keeping your body healthy while working on the land and small scale logging safety will be included.

Timely Topics and Opportunities—Planned topics here include creative ways to add value to forest resources, establishing and maintaining trust with logging contractors, and personal landowner experience with land trusts. These timely topics will interest the forest landowner as well as the professional forester.

There will be a special awards presentation in conjunction with the Idaho Tree Farm Program on Monday evening which participants are encouraged to attend.

Registration for the workshop will be \$35 per person or \$60 per couple and includes two luncheons and any materials. Forest industry and or-

ganizational exhibits will be on display to add to the variety of the workshop. Commercial exhibit space is available for \$100 which includes one workshop registration.

Other workshop sponsors include the Panhandle Lakes and Upper Columbia RC&D Councils, Idaho Department of Lands, U. S. Forest Service (Region 1), University of Idaho, and USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service.

Internet Charges— Last May the FCC came out against charging for Internet access. I talked with Marcia Smith, IPUC Commissioner this week and she said that discussions are underway at the FCC concerning the possibility of allowing local providers to charge for Internet usage. The FCC is soliciting comments and suggestions.

Troy Area Extended Area Service— Commissioner Smith reported that TDS in the Troy area is developing an extended area service proposal which should soon be sent to the IPUC. After a full review, a public hearing would be scheduled sometime in the summer. Needless to say, this is all a bit tentative.

HB487— This bill was introduced by Rep. Jim Kepton last year. The bill adds to existing law to provide a claims and arbitration process if local government actions affect the value of real property. I've received a number of inquiries on this bill.

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The bill has been called by some the "takings" bill. According to my analysis the bill, if passed, would cripple land use planning, zoning, and environmental controls on private property. David Peckham points out that the entire bill can be read at www.idwr.state.id.us/legislat / track 98.html. I plan on opposing the bill.

Supermajority/School Facilities— Representatives Tilman, Boe, and I met with Governor Batt one morning to discuss our proposed legislation which would reduce the supermajority to 60% in school bond elections. This is a proposed constitutional amendment that if passed by two-thirds of the legislators would then go on the ballot in the '98 general election. The legislation also provides that school bond elections be held on the four state designated election dates including the primary and general election. My impression is that the Governor feels it is more of a legislative matter but thanked us for the update.

The 60% majority should be coupled with some state funding. Senator Cameron is proposing legislation to set up the mechanism for state monies for school facilities. Senator Stennett will introduce a bill to funnel the \$20 million Idaho receives from the state lottery to the K-12 schools facilities and maintenance fund. The

downside is that Higher Education would lose out on the \$10 million currently designated for the permanent building fund. Critical school building problems such as the Troy High School need to be addressed, and a state match of 25% would help keep property taxes at about the same level.

HB426 — Employment Security Law— This bill will save Idaho employers about \$112 million over the next four years. It will cut the standard unemployment insurance taxes for some businesses by nearly 30%. The bill passed the House this week (12/28/98) on a 68-0 vote indicating widespread bipartisan support.

Patient Freedom of Information Act— This bill is just being printed. The proposed act will create a program that will require health care providers to submit their professional histories to their respective licensing board at the time they apply for their annual license renewal. The boards will then make these profiles available to the public upon request. This will fill an informational need for consumers.

HB443 Budget Stabilization Act— This bill would create the Budget Stabilization Fund by transferring all monies in current budget reserve account, then annually adding 1% of any revenue growth over 4%. The

total amount of the fund is not to exceed 5% of the next year's general fund budget Expenditures from the fund can occur only by concurrent resolutions with at least two-thirds vote in both chambers. If this bill passes it could well cost K-12 education \$15,000,000. I will vote against the bill when it is introduced because of a potential negative impact to both K-12 and higher education funding. Every state has as many votes in the Electoral College as the total of its senators and representatives in Congress. Amendment 23 to the U.S. Constitution, ratified in 1961, gave the District of Columbia three electoral votes.
