Effie Powell, 99, **Longtime Area Resident Passes**

Effie L. Powell, 99, a recent Lew-, iston resident and former longtime resident of the Kendrick area, died of causes related to age Wednesday, Feb. 4, 1998, five days short of her 100th birthday, at Sun River Manor in Lewiston.

She was born Feb. 9, 1898, to Edward and Laura Calvert Gallaher near Spokane.

She married Clifford P. Powell Aug. 31, 1919, at her parents home in Juliaetta. He died March 9, 1965. She graduated from Walla Walla High School in 1916 and attended Lewis-Clark Normal School.

She taught in several country schools prior to her marriage.

She farmed with her husband at Leland, Cream Ridge and Lenore and in 1945 bought a farm near Spalding. After his death she moved to Clarkston. She cared for her sister-in-law and other shut-ins in their homes. She spent 16 years in Kendrick as a companion to Martha Wil-

She enjoyed growing flowers and prided herself at being able to identify all wild flowers. She enjoyed quilting, hooking rugs and Scrabble. She was active in the Juliaetta and Kendrick communities. She was a charter member of the Cottonwood Creek Community Church.

She is survived by two daughters, Marjorie Stevens of Juliaetta and Carol Glass of Boise; three grandchildren; seven great-grandchildren; and one great-great-grandchild.
