# Sharing the Asset Message . . .

The information will be taken from resources provided by the Search Institue, an organization supported by Lutheran Erotherhood, which also provides financial services, community services opportunities, and philanthropic outreach in communities nationwide. #### A NEW PERSPECTIVE:

In today's society, we are constantly bombarded with messages about problems facing our children and youth: failure in school, violence, alcohol abuse, teen pregnancy, and sucide. And we have invested a lot of time and money in trying to FIX these problems. You see, the goal of a problem-focused approach is to reduce or control risky behavior through prevention or intervention programs, such as social services, treatment, or, when the problem becomes too severe, incarceration. A limited number of professionals-often supported by public funds- do most of the work.

Some of these strategies have been effective. But at the same time, they only treat the problem and often neglect the causes. Alone, they fail to do the job.

By focusing on the problem, we make temporary repairs. A problem-centered focus does not allow us to look at how we treat children and youth. At best we see moderate change in behavior- April 28, Lukecart said. Volunteers -at worst we see increased violence and failure in school.

It does not have to be this way. A new approach that can be summed up as "asset building" is an approach that challenges communities such as Kendrick to tap the caring, creative energies of families, neighborhoods, schools, congregations, and others to rise to the challenge to provide a healthly community committed to helping youth.


