Exploring Developmental Assets . . .

Last week we looked at strategies to control risky behavior, this week we will take a global look at the two categories of Developmental Assets. Developmental Assets can be grouped into two main blocks: external assets and internal assets.

External Assets—support, empowerment, boundaries and expectations, and constructive use of time—refers to the positive developmental environments and experiences that surround young people. The main builders of these assets for infants and young children are parents, extended family, and other adult caregivers. As children enter adolescence, external assets accumulate through formal and informal interactions with parents and other caring adults, neighbors, educators, congregations, and peers.

Internal Assets—commitments to learning, positive values, social competencies, and positive identity—forge the resolve, skills, and values needed to form strong character. Parents and other caregivers nurture these assets for infants and children by example, by teaching and by encouraging their natural curiosity. During the teen years, these assets help provide young people with an "internal compass" that guides them to make wise choices.

Latah, Nez Perce Sheriffs Tell of Goals, Accomplishments at Grange Meeting

On Tuesday, February 17, Kendrick Grange No. 413 hosted a meeting with Latah County Sheriff Jeffrey Crouch and Nez Perce County Administrative Sergeant Bill Madison. This meeting is held annually to give area residents an opportunity to meet the sheriffs, see how cooperative law enforcement is working in our area, and to get an update on the changes within the departments over the past year.

The Latah County Sheriff (LCS) has instituted several positive programs and changes. The 911 Emergency number can now identify the physical address of callers from Kendrick, Juliaetta and Troy within 10-15 seconds. Last year that was not possible and next year the enhanced 911 system will do this automatically. A school resource officer, Steve Jarvis, is now assigned to provide education and safety programs in the schools. This service is provided at no charge to the schools and they can select from a menu of programs. Officer Jarvis also handles the child abuse and neglect cases. The sheriff has also implemented standardized hiring practices (no more "good ol' boy" network) and produced a policy and procedures manual. Latah County is now back in the Quad-cities Drug Task Force with a full time investigator. There is also a sub-group of this task force that works in cities on the Idaho side of the border. The Department also has a \$24,000 contract with the Forest Service to patrol their campgrounds and receives another \$3,000 for marijuana eradication. Latah County also has a Chaplain's Program. These chaplains ride along to help provide support and comfort in tragic and stressful situations and they also provide a sounding board for the deputies so that the stresses of the job don't overcome or affect their job performance and family life.

Sheriff Crouch said that he and Latah County are blessed with the most volunteer organizations of any department in the state. Currently Latah County has a Horse Posse, a Search & Rescue Unit, a Vehicle Posse, a Ham Radio Club, a Snowmobile Posse, and a Reserve Academy for Deputies. These people have been very helpful in the Hazel Martin case, and the Horse Posse was helpful in rounding up cows, pigs and horses in the Walsber animal cruelty case.

Last year there were 366 motor vehicle accidents with 2 fatalities. About 20% are alcohol related. DUI grants. The department generated in 1997. These have been made a priority by the department along with liquor law violation citations. Citations for illegal possession of alcohol increased from 343 in 1996 to 473 in 1997. This past year the department was able to increase service without increasing the county budget due to revenue from Federal grants. The department generated money for the county general fund by collecting \$80,000 for boarding prisoners, \$57,000 for drivers' license transactions, and \$2,400 for serving civil warrants.

Nez Perce County, which patrols 602 miles of roadway with scattered cities has also undergone several changes this past year. The biggest change has been in the area of communication with other agencies and within the department. This change alone has greatly increased the cooperation with other agencies. The NP Sheriff's Department now has a snowmobile patrol agreement with the Fish and Game Dept. to patrol the Craig Mt. area. The resident deputy program with Mike Rigney at Peck and Bill Madison at Culdesac handles calls in that area and attends city council meetings to increase awareness of city concerns. the academy. NP County has a Dive team, that is utilized by Latah County on occasion, which is supported by three boats and a raft that allows divers to be placed in swift water. In 1997 the divers had seven boating accidents with three drowning victims, one minor injury, one severe injury, and one hit and run boat accident. The 41-member Mounted Posse which was used for parades until 1997 is now used in river accidents and the boat patrol. The 17-member Air Posse along with the NP County-owned plane is used for river recovery and locating lost people.

The department has six new persons which has necessitated much more training, and went to 4 10-hour shifts which allows for a six-hour overlap in coverage while increasing the morale in the department. The Community Policing Program, which is more involved than originally thought, is in its infancy. The Department is setting up a trial program with the local seniors and is working on a refrigerator card and awareness program.

The one disappointment so far for Sheriff Kingsbury has been the failure to hire a woman deputy. So far some good candidates have passed the written and physical tests but were unable to complete the 1½-mile run.

The NP County jail is also a problem. The 1924 jail is not big enough to keep prisoners properly segregated and also has leaking sewage and water pipes. This results in a \$200,000 annual cost to transport and board prisoners in Latah, Shoshone and Washington County jails. Unfortunately the three bond attempts to upgrade the jail failed because voters thought the prisoners were going to get luxury accommodations. That's not the case according to Officer Madison and the jail is so dangerous for personnel that the ACLU sued the county in 1988.

The casino hasn't had any criminal problems, but traffic at the Highway 95 intersection has caused several accidents. There was also a noticeable increase in civil crimes, such as bad checks, etc., about a month after the casino opened.

Overall, both sheriffs were happy with the increased cooperation between the departments and with the cities of their respective counties. Both departments are looking to increase citizen involvement and service to the communities.

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Legal Notice

CITY OF KENDRICK, IDAHO
ORDINANCE NO. 675

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, IDAHO, GRANTING A FRANCHISE TO THE POTLATCH TELEPHONE COMPANY, INC., ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, TO CONSTRUCT, REPAIR, OPERATE AND MAINTAIN A TELEPHONE SYSTEM IN THE CITY OF KENDRICK, IDAHO, INCLUDING THE PLACEMENT OF POLES, WIRES, AND OTHER APPLIANCES ABOVE AND UNDER THE RIGHTS OF WAY OF THE CITY. SETTING FORTH CONDITIONS ACCOMPANYING THE GRANT OF FRANCHISE; PROVIDING FOR CITY REGULATIONS; AND PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE: This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Potlatch Telephone Company Franchise Ordinance."

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS. For the purposes of this ordinance, the following terms, phrases, words, and derivations shall have the meaning given herein. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural number include the singular number, and words in the singular number the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directory.

(1) "City" is the City of Kendrick, Idaho.

(2) "Company" is the Potlatch Telephone Company, Inc., an Idaho Corporation, the grantee of rights under this Franchise.

(3) "Council" is the City Council of the City of Kendrick, Idaho.

(4) "Person" is any person, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind.

SECTION 3. GRANT OF AUTHORITY. The City hereby grants to the Company the right and privilege to construct, erect, operate and maintain, in, upon, along, across, above, over and under the streets, alleys, now laid out or dedicated, and all extensions thereof, and additions thereto, in the City and in,

for a period of two (2) years. Where a hazardous circumstance exists, the City may make temporary restoration at the Company's expense. Should the Company fail to restore in a timely manner, after written notice from the City, the City may restore the surface and bill the Company for such expense.

SECTION 9. RELOCATION. In the event that at any time during the period of this Franchise the City shall lawfully elect to alter, or change the grade of, any street, alley or other public way, the Company, upon reasonable notice by the City, shall remove, relay, and relocate its poles, wires, cables, underground conduits, manholes and other telephone fixtures at its own expense. Should such alteration be required solely to benefit a private property owner, the expense of such alteration shall be recovered from such owner.

SECTION 10. PLACEMENT OF FIXTURES. The Company shall not place poles or other fixtures where the same will interfere with any lamp, electric light, water hydrant or water main, and all such poles or other fixtures placed in any street shall be placed at the outer edge of the sidewalk and inside the curb line, and those placed in alleys shall be placed close to the line of the lot abutting on said alley, and then in such a manner as not to interfere with the usual travel on said streets, alleys and public ways.

SECTION 11. TEMPORARY REMOVAL OF WIRE FOR BUILDING MOVING. The Company shall, on the request of any person lawfully moving a building, temporarily raise or lower its wires to permit the moving of the building. The expense of such temporary raising or lowering of wires shall be paid by the person requesting the same, and the Company shall have the authority to require such payment in advance. The Company shall be given not less than forty-eight (48) hours' advance notice to arrange for such temporary wire changes.

SECTION 12. TREE TRIMMING. The Company shall have authority to trim trees upon and overhanging streets, alleys, sidewalks public places of the City so as to prevent the branches of such trees from coming in contact with the wires and cables of the Company, all trimming to be done by skilled professionals, in a workmanlike manner, under the supervision of the City, and at the expense of the Company.

SECTION 13. CITY RIGHTS. The City does not intend and does not, by this Ordinance, relinquish any of its police powers. The right is hereby reserved to the City to adopt, in addition to the provisions herein contained and existing applicable ordinances, such additional ordinances, rules and regulations as it shall find necessary to the exercise of the police power, provided that such regulations, by ordinance or otherwise, shall not be in conflict with the laws of the State of Idaho or the rules and regulations of the Public Utilities Commission of the State of Idaho or any other regulatory body or bodies as may from time to time have competent regulatory jurisdiction over the Company.

SECTION 14. SUPERVISION AND INSPECTION. The City shall have the right to supervise all construction or installation work performed subject to the provisions of this Ordinance and to make such inspections as it shall find necessary to insure compliance with governing ordinances.

SECTION 15. TERM OF FRANCHISE. The Franchise and rights granted shall take effect and be in force from and after the final passage hereof, as required by law, and upon filing of acceptance by the Company with the City Clerk, and shall continue in force and effect for a term of ten (ten) years after the effective date of this Franchise. Provided, that if the acceptance is not filed within ninety (90) days after the adoption of this Ordinance, the provisions of this Franchise shall, at the option of the City, be null and void.

SECTION 16. PUBLICATION COSTS AND EXPENSES. The Company shall reimburse the City for any expenses incurred by the City related to the grant of this Franchise, including the cost of publication of this Franchise as such publication is required by law.

SECTION 17. In the event that Idaho Law permits cities to collect franchise or other fees from telephone companies in the future, this Ordinance will be amended by the parties within six month of the effective date of such law.

SECTION 18. SEPARABILITY. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance shall for any reason be held invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect, invalidate or nullify the remaining portions of the Ordinance.

SECTION 19. INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCE. As required in and by Section 50-329, Idaho Code, more than thirty (30) days have elapsed since the introduction of this Ordinance.

SECTION 20. PRIOR PUBLICATION OF ORDINANCE. This Ordinance, together with a notice of a proposal for its adoption, was published in full in an issue of the official newspaper of the City prior to the adoption of this Ordinance as required by Section 50-329, Idaho Code.

SECTION 21. REPEAL. All ordinances and parts of ordinances of the City insofar only as they are in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 22. PUBLICATION. That this Ordinance shall, within one (1) month after its passage, be published in one (1) issue of the Kendrick Gazette, the official newspaper of the City of Kendrick, Idaho.

SECTION 23. EFFECTIVE DATE. That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage, approval and publication mentioned in Paragraph 22 above.

Electronic Tax Filing

Can Mean Faster Refunds

Looking for the fastest way to get your income tax refund? Try electronic filing.

The Idaho State Tax Commission can issue a refund in as few as seven to 10 days with electronic filing, versus four to six weeks for a tax return filed by mail.

Both taxpayers and the government benefit from the lower error rate on electronically filed returns, according to Dawn Glazier, electronic filing coordinator for the Tax Commission. She said the error rate for electronic returns is only 2%, compared with 25% for paper returns.

"Errors on paper returns take longer to process," Glazier said, "which means it could take longer than eight weeks to issue a refund."

Glazier said 34,000 Idaho taxpayers filed their income tax returns electronically last year, compared with 480,000 who filed paper returns.

About 21,000 returns were filed electronically in the first five weeks of this year's tax filing season, she said, 70 of those through an internet service. The only internet site currently available for electronic filing of Idaho returns is www.securetax.com.

More than 400 tax preparers throughout Idaho are set up to do electronic filing for clients.

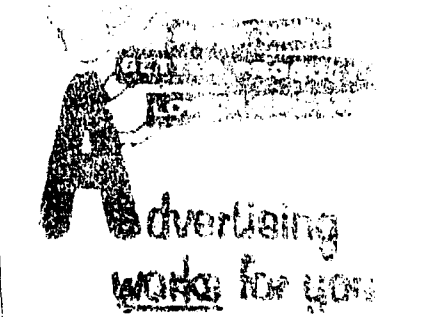
