An open letter to all the truck drivers who have driven Highway 3 for the past twenty years:

For almost fourteen years I drove a battered green 79 Ford on Highway 3 and on to Lewiston every morning between 2 and 3 a. m. Many times you have blinked your lights at me to warn me of a rock in the road or an ISP around the corner and one time, one of you blinked furiously and even honked your horn. Around the next corner were three large horses in my lane. Due to the warning, I didn't hit any of them. In 1990, on December 1st, my car was stolen and I was forced to bring the old truck back into use. I got some new tires and a tune-up, but "Flossy" was fourteen and had about 300,000 miles on her, and on the coldest day of that December she quit at the water falls. There just wasn't room on my side of the road to get her off the pavement, and I was afraid if I pushed her backward to the other side I would not be able to stop and it's a ways down to the tracks. Grain truck drivers, chip truck drivers, log truck drivers and an occasional long haul driver have given me assistance, or warnings, and when I couldn't see well enough to drive as fast as the truckers, I always pulled over and also blinked my lights to let them know they were clear of me.

Again, thanks to all of you. I am sure I could not have driven that road for 20 years without a mishap if it hadn't been for you!

In regard to the Latah Co. Fair and the problems associated with it, there are a few points I would like to make. On the "open" sale: the 4-H guidelines clearly state that 4-H is to be actively involved with all portions of its programs. A livestock sale is not a requirement. A sale is desired, however, and 4-H should be actively involved in it. This includes the use of the 4-H emblem and the awards that go to the youth and the project animal. If the project animal is sold outside an approved 4-H sale, then it is illegal to advertise (name of youth) and his/her 4-H project and the awards won.

While many of us have youth in both 4-H and FFA, not all communities have both programs. 4-H involves the majority of youth and projects in the fair compared to FFA. While 4-H involves youth from 8-19, FFA is for high school age youth only.

Participants will be given literature about the new welder and cutter as well as general welding information. Those who attend will have the opportunity to operate the new equipment. All interested are welcome.

The parents, the youth owners of that project animal and businesses do NOT feel the project is over until the checks have been received and the bills paid.

The 4-H/FFA sale is designed to support our youth in an agricultural, educational setting. We do not support an open livestock sale yard on the Latah Co. Fairgrounds. If it were not for the supporters of our youth from our communities, the youth could not afford most of the livestock projects on a one animal basis. The profit margin is not there when buying grain bag by bag and hay bale by bale.

Our desire is to return common sense and reinstate a contract between the Fairgrounds and the Extension Service. The youth are the ones being caught in the middle of conflict. It should be their projects and their sale.

I feel there is a conflict of interest with the Troy FFA having a sole and separate building and fundraising opportunity on the Latah Co. Fairgrounds. It does not benefit any other FFA club and certainly does not benefit any 4-H program or club. Only they reap any benefits. The same is true of a certain 4-H leader who has personal gain in his booth at the fair.

Leaders Council voted to disband the former livestock sale committee. It was being operated by people with their own personal agendas. The 4-H representative(s) were not correctly and adequately representing the 4-H committees who elected them.

The major problem, as I see it, lies in pride, greed, and power struggles. The youth did not create the problems—adults did. The adults need to stop this nonsense.

The Extension Service will need to run their 4-H program without interference. Fair board members will need to reinstate a contract that allows 4-H youth to continue participating in the Latah Co. Fair and sale. It can be done, if the "key people" will allow it to be done. Let's consider the youth of Latah Co.—make them the priority!

Lewiston Health Dept. is open every Wednesday; 1st and 3rd Wednesday from 1:00 to 6:00, and every other Wednesday from 1 to 4. Moscow Health Dept. is open every Wednesday from 1 to 4.

The Kendrick Tiger baseball team came back from its spring break last week and rolled up three baseball wins—two in league play and one nonleague to bring its record to 2-0 in league and 9-4 overall.

Last Tuesday Coach Kevin Driskill sent his two sophomore pitchers, Jody Brown and Andrew Heimgartner, to the mound against the visiting Nezperce Indians and the blanked the Indians 13-0 in five innings.

Brown started for the Tigers and he pitched three scoreless innings, striking out five and walking five. Heimgartner came in in the fourth and gave up a double and struck out one in the contest that was shortened because of the 10-run mercy rule.

Kendrick got two hits from Tony Howerton and Josh Fletcher and singles from Nate Eichner, Trevor Groseclose and a double from Luke Ogle.

Kendrick had a big second inning when the team scored 8 runs on 3 hits, 2 errors, four hit batters and two walks.

The Tigers were back on their home Juliaetta field Saturday to beat Highland 13-3 and Nezperce again 8-3.

Matt Tefft started the Highland game Saturday morning and blanked the Huskies for 4 innings before Heimgartner came on in the fourth to finish out the five inning game.

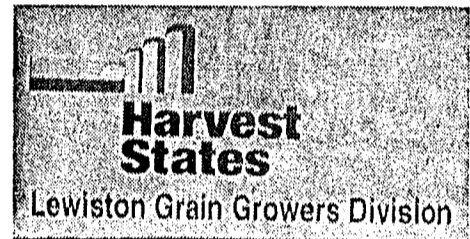
