A Pastor Who Stayed

In December, 1935, a young man not long out of seminary came by train to be the new pastor of Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church. His name is Theodore Albert Meske. Pastor Meske served the Cameron parish for almost 41 years, retiring in 1976. His annual beginning salary was eight hundred dollars. Cameron Emmanuel, along with her sister church, Zion Lutheran of Juliaetta, was his one and only parish. During all those years he received occasional "calls" from other Lutheran churches, but since the people never asked him to leave, he preferred to stay at Cameron. During his first summer here, his parents came for a visit. During that time his father became ill, and within several days passed away. That was a difficult, grief-filled time for the young pastor. Until this time he did not own a car. He now took over his father's car payments and acquired the vehicle which he badly needed. His mother later came and lived with him for awhile.

In his 40 years of ministry he missed only two Sundays of preaching. Quite a record! He also had an active Luther League and taught Bible School on Saturdays.

Some members of his parish were baptised, confirmed and married by him.

He married Lillian Sellaff of Ritzville in November, 1937. She passed away in 1983.

Their four children are: Ted of Southwick, Duane of Lewiston, Mary Abitz, Southwick, and Ann Parks of Leland. There are eight grandchildren.

His hobbies include bowling, all sports, and pinocle. He enjoyed gardening, fishing and hunting. He loved the mountains and the people in his parish.

During his ministry a new parsonage and a new church were erected at Cameron and a new church in Juliaetta.

Pastor Meske is now (at age 89) confined mainly to a wheelchair. He resides at Life Care Center in Lewiston.

Pastor Meke was born at La Grande, Oregon. He grew up in a loving home with two brothers. His father, too, was a Lutheran minister. Times were not easy, and to get through high school and seminary, he worked at a variety of menial, low-paying jobs. Having no car, he usually "thumbed" his way from one job to another. Some of his jobs included working on the railroad "extra" gang, driving horse-drawn wagons during harvest, handling filled wheat sacks, night-time telephone operator-janitor, and even assisting an undertaker friend with moving and embalming bodies.

During his seminary years he often sat at the cleaners while his only pair of pants were cleaned and repaired.

Now, as we approach a new century, we often do not realize how very hard times were in the early part of this century.

Ask someone like Pastor Theodore Meske . . . he remembers those times!

Harold Olderness, 92, Formerly of Kendrick, Passes April 10 in Spokane

Harold L. Olderness, 92, a former Kendrick resident and businessman died in Spokane Friday, April 10. He and his wife Ida operated her erness Dept. Store here for a number of years.

He was born in Ionia, Michigan in 1906. At the age of 13 he worked on boats in Puget Sound as a deck hand, and learned several trades working as a welder and foreman for a shipyard during the war. He then worked on roads for the State of Washington as a civil engineer.

In 1951 he moved to Spokane and worked for Kaiser Aluminum in between funnel contracts.

He and his wife, Ida, moved to Kendrick where they operated her parents' dry goods store, Thurber and Olderness.

Harold was a member of the Boilermakers Union, the Gideons, participated in Project Joy, and had traveled the country touring with musical groups.

Survivors include his wife of 44 years; a son Dick Cross of Loon Lake, Wash.; three daughters, Nadene Stephenson of Edmonds, Wash., Seeran Phelps of Loon Lake and Verna Adams of Lewiston; 11 grandchildren, 25 great-grandchildren and three great-great-grandchildren.

Funeral service was held April 15 in the Rose Chapel of Hennessey-Smith Funeral Home with pastor Lawrence Hudson officiating. Interment followed at Fairmont Memorial Park.

The Mystery Dinner Theater scheduled for this week has been postponed until May 15-16.

This unusual dinner mystery will be served for two nights only: Friday and Saturday, May 15 and 16 starting at 7:00 both evenings. Subtitled, "The Romeo from Juliaetta," this exciting mixture of marriage, mirth and murder will have audience-participants with a full evening of entertainment, along with dining and detecting. Following the exciting events of the evening, the audience will have an opportunity to determine "who done it," with prize possibilities for the successful amateur detectives.

"Murder at the Altar" follows the tradition of Interactive mystery dinner theater's long, slightly shady place in the history of American drama. It is an offshoot of two of the least reputable literary movements of the 1960s. Those are: Dinner theater, which is based on the idea that bad food would somehow make mediocre actors seem good by comparison, and improvisational comedy, which is dedicated to the proposition that authors not funny enough to write actual jokes and performers too lazy to learn their lines could still rake in the customers' money. Naturally this particular mystery dinner comedy far exceeds those humble origins and "delivers the goods" with a deliciously entertaining night of terror and delight.

The wedding drama, written, produced and directed by Ellen Magnuson, Kari Galloway, and the cast, is based on a concept by Mary Beth Legenaur. Music will be provided by Lucille Magnuson and her Kendrick-Juliaetta Big Band (downsized to enhance shareholder value). The event is sponsored by the Kendrick-Juliaetta Arts Committee. 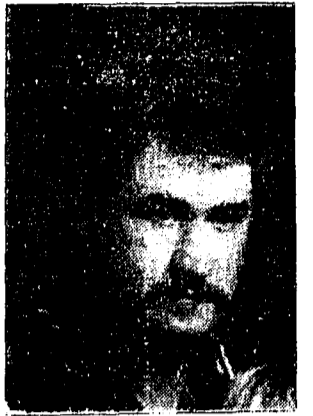
KCK MEETS APR. 27

SUMMARY OF KENDRICK ORDINANCE NO. 676

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF IDAHO; PROVIDING FOR THE ADOPTION OF PARKING REGULATIONS WITHIN THE CITY OF KENDRICK; PROVIDING THAT THE REGISTERED OWNER OF A VEHICLE SHALL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY VIOLATION OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS CHAPTER; PROVIDING THAT VIOLATION OF PARKING REGULATIONS IS A NUISANCE; PROVIDING FOR TOWING OF UNLAWFULLY PARKED VEHICLES; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

Section 1 establishes definitions. Section 2 defines a nuisance, declares vehicle owner responsible for violation. Section 3 limits parking to certain areas. Section 4 directs the City Public Works Director to designate parking areas. Section 5 discusses forty-eight hour parking, abandoned vehicles, and impoundment of illegally-parked vehicles. Section 6 prohibits repair of vehicles on public property within the City. Section 7 establishes violations, ticketing of vehicles, and fines. Section 8 gives direction regarding removal of vehicles, towing, and storage. Section 9 provides for severability. Section 10 makes the ordinance effective upon passage, approval and publication. This ordinance was passed on the 14th day of April, 1998. The full ordinance is on file with the Kendrick City Clerk, and will be promptly provided to any citizen on personal request.

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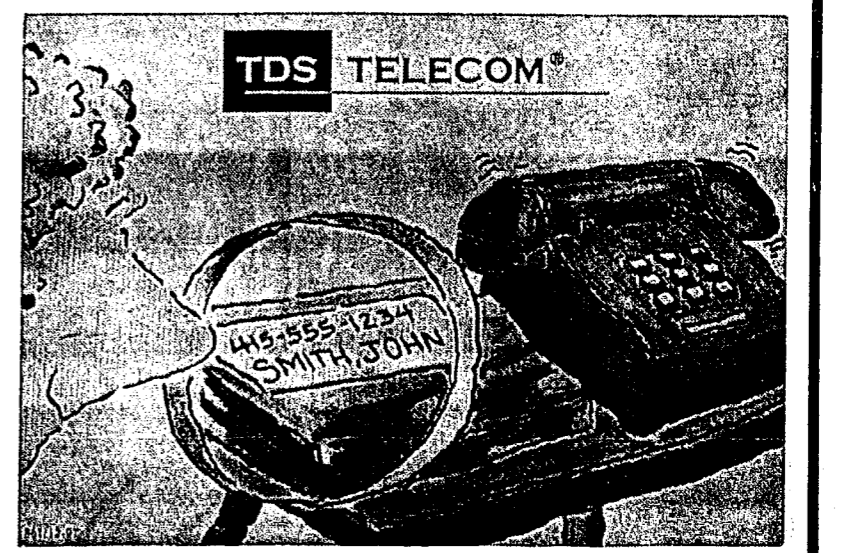

Exploring Empowerment

Principal, Kendrick High School
Previously we examined the many faces of Support, this week we will look at Empowerment.

Empowerment encompasses the below listed areas:

- 1) Community values Youth—Young person perceives that adults in the community value youth.
- 2) Youth as resources—Young people are given useful roles in the community.
- 3) Service to others—Young person serves in the community one hour per week.
- 4) Safety—Young person feels safe at home, at school, and in the community.

Empowerment — Children and youth who are treated as individuals with their own strengths and needs, learn to value themselves. And when they feel good about themselves, they're best able to help others. Even toddlers can learn to be of service—like putting away toys. Older youth can see the value of service on a larger scale. For instance, in one community young people surveyed the town to identify safe places that youth could go within walking distance from where they lived. In another community young people who were at-risk were engaged to build picnic tables for the local park. Many times adults do not draw on youth for help simply because they feel they do not have the time to be a mentor. Mentor time often makes the difference in a young person's life. Can we as a community afford not to mentor our youth?
