The Tigers collected three of their seven hits in the final inning, but the winning run was scored when a batter was hit by a pitch with the bases loaded.

Kendrick committed 12 errors and watched as 13 Tigers struck out. Jody Brown went all the way on the mound for the Tigers, striking out 13 as the Wolves committed 7 errors.

Supt. Taylor Answers Questions About May 19 M&O Levy

On Tuesday, May 19, at the same time voters in Zones 1 and 4 will be voting on the Trustee Election between Incumbent Gary Browning, and Gale Vallem, and Jenifer Parsley Curry and Bob Callison, respectively, all voters within Kendrick Jt. School District No. 283 will also be asked to approve a \$220,000 Maintenance and Operation Override levy.

Superintendent of School Eldon Taylor said he has been asked questions by patrons and to help understand the levy, has answered a few of the more frequent inquiries here.

Question: Will a \$220,000 Override Levy increase one's property tax for those property owners within the boundaries of Kendrick Jt. School District No. 283?

Answer: No. The school board of trustees froze the override amount for the fourth year at \$220,000. Maintenance and operations override levies cover such items of the education program such as books, supplies, school utilities, building maintenance and supplies, employee medical benefit, etc.

Question: How does our district's M&O supplement override compare to our neighbors for the 1998-99 school year?

Answer: Very well. Here is how:

Ordinance No. 259 provides for the rates to be charged for water services by the City of Juliaetta, Idaho; prescribes the rules and regulations for the conduct and operation of the water system of the city and connection therewith, regulating and governing the use of water from said system; providing penalties for nonpayment of water service and for violation of this ordinance, and providing an effective date, which was October 6, 1992.

Anyone wishing to see this ordinance in its entirety may do so at the City Hall during regular hours.




