

## Regional History Workshop, Fair at Orofino June 13

Pursuing the theme "Preserving the Past to Create the Future," regional history buffs will be meeting at the Clearwater National Forest Supervisors Office Building in Orofino from 10:00 to 3:00 on Saturday, June 13. In previous sessions, participants have shared their experiences in preserving regional history. Many have learned new skills in searching out and recording that history by viewing displays and taking home handouts brought by speakers and participating organizations and individuals. The focus of the upcoming workshop will be on the filing and retrieval of materials.

Chief presenter for the day will be Jerry Abraham, Archivist from the University of Idaho. Titled his presentation "Intellectual Organization of Primary Sources," Abraham will offer important guidance on the practical and critically important tasks of filing historical materials and then being able to retrieve them for future reference. A native of Oregon, Abraham did graduate work in librarianship, fine arts, and archival management before joining the staff of the Manuscripts-Archives Division of Washington State University. In 1984 he assumed the position of Head of Special Collections and Archives at the University of Idaho.

Other presenters include noted Orofino author Tom Farbo and Ed Lozar. Everett Martin, chairman of the Weippe Lewis & Clark Bicentennial Committee will give a poetic reading on "When FDR Stood at the Gates of Hell." Farbo will describe his filing methods and reveal some findings to be included in his next book. Lozar will discuss the filing system used by the Clearwater National Forest Service. In addition, representatives of regional history related groups will report on their organizations' latest projects in preserving local and regional history. Space will be provided for the display of materials and exchange of informational handouts, with set-up scheduled to begin at 9:00 a. m. along with registration.

This latest workshop and display fair is hosted by the Clearwater National Forest Center at 12730 Highway 12 in Orofino's Riverside addition. Sponsors include the Idaho Humanities Council and the LCSC College Institute for Community Development. Clearwater County history and genealogy related societies and museums are providing active assistance.

A \$10 per person charge covers lunch, dessert, and beverages provided by Orofino's Country Caterers. Advanced registration is appreciated. ## Constructive Use Of Time . . .

Last time we looked at Boundaries and Expectations, this week we will explore constructive use of time.

Turning off the TV can be the start.

A family in Minnesota tried an experiment with television. On school days, they kept the set off and encouraged the kids to read and focus on homework. As a "trade-off," they had unlimited weekend television use. For the first month, the kids flocked to the TV immediately after school on Friday. But gradually over the next few months, they began to lose interest in television. The family started spending more time engaged in family activities as well as getting homework done. Parents and kids both enjoyed the increased interaction and found that family conflicts decreased dramatically.

Some ways to use time in a constructive manner are:

Creative activities—Young person spends time in lessons or practice in music, theater, or other arts.

Youth programs—Young person spends three or more hours per week in sports, clubs, or organizations at school or in the community.

Religious community—Young people spend time engaged in church activities.

Time at home—Young people are out with friends "with nothing special to do" two or fewer nights a week.

Next week: Commitment to learning.

## M&O Override Levy Tax Vote is May 19

Next Tuesday, May 19, voters in Kendrick Jt. School District No. 283 will go to the polls to vote on a \$220,000 override levy. In an effort to explain how important this issue is to the schools, Supt. Eldon Taylor has two of the most frequently asked questions and explains them here.

Question—  
How much will this \$220,000 maintenance and operation override raise our property taxes?

Answer—  
The M&O override levy will not raise your taxes because the board of trustees froze the override at the \$220,000 level. This will be the 4th year at this \$220,000 level and will cover such items as school utilities, building maintenance, books, supplies, employee medical benefits, etc.

Question—  
Why are some districts able to reduce overrides, others raise them, and some freeze them such as ours?

Answer—

Each district is unique in Idaho on what their local needs are: Genesee is maintaining their levy for this year's \$253,000 for the second year in a row. Whitepine is raising their override by \$125,000 from this year's \$475,000 to maintain their current program. Potlatch is lowering their levy by \$1,000 from this year's \$320,000 because voters recently passed a sizeable plant facility override to meet some roofing needs of the district. Moscow as well as Kendrick froze their levy the same as this year's. Lewiston raised their revenue \$52,511 from this year's \$8,430,593 because as a charter school district (charter meaning Lewiston had a school district before Idaho became a state) they set a tax levy rate instead of a fixed dollar amount like all other districts except Boise are required to do.
