

About the V. F. W. Post and Building

Members of the VFW Roof Committee have been contacted regarding rumors that the VFW is about to become defunct, go bankrupt or otherwise cease functioning and/or the building is to be sold. Nothing could be further from the truth. Folks, there is no basis for such rumors and it is unfortunate that expression of thought or opinion should result in such rumors. While it is true that some members are not very active, the Post has 90 members and the Auxiliary has 87. Additionally, the Deary Post is in the process of consolidating with the Kendrick Post, which provides a greater membership to carry on the work and the traditions. Discussion will take place regarding utilization of the building if and when alternatives may be appropriate and it is recognized that this discussion topic may have led to inaccurate perceptions. There is no plan or intention to give up the Post Charter or the building in any fashion or for any reason! The VFW opened an appeal to the community at large to help with a project to install a new roof. As a result, this has led to the misconception that the building is to be sold. The reason for the roof project is to insure that the integrity of the building is not compromised and that it will be available for the VFW and the area community for an extended period. The Post and Auxiliary have always been involved in community projects and have engaged in continuous efforts to raise money to pay the bills for maintenance, improvement and repair. Items such as floor refinishing, stop-gap work on the roof to halt leaks, improve bathroom facilities, paint and general upkeep, replace the pump on the furnace boiler heat system, improve access from lot and lighting for the parking lot, replace doors as well as refrigeration and kitchen capability are some major projects that have been undertaken in recent years. In addition to the work, additional financial help has often been required of members. There are also the monthly/periodic bills to be paid: heating oil, electricity, phone service, water and sewer, sales tax and supplies to keep the building functioning as well as necessary licenses to renew. So while a certain level of income is realized, it is very difficult to stay up with the bills, let alone fund a project of about \$10,000. Any talk/rumor of the Post or building closing should be directed to a knowledgeable member of the VFW to separate fact from opinion or speculation and preclude rumors or misunderstandings.

Kendrick Babe Ruth Team Open Season with Win

The Kendrick Tiger Babe Ruth league baseball team kicked off the 1998 season with a 4-1 win over the Genesee Yankees. Genesee pitcher Brandon Cleveland and David Agee pitching for the Tigers, hooked up in a pitching duel in a game in which only 1 base hit was recorded. Kendrick opened the game by getting two consecutive walks and appeared to be off to a great start. However southpaw Genesee pitcher Brandon Cleveland, anticipating a steal play, picked the runner off at first and then covered home to tag out the other base runner who was attempting to score on an over-throw.

David Agee started the game by striking out the first 3 batters he faced. However, Genesee scored in the second inning. Cleveland opened the inning with high pop up for the first out and Chris Cyr smashed a line drive. However it was right at second baseman Christopher Gibbs-Dudunake who made a nice catch to record the second out. Then on a 2-2 count, Mike Davis hit a high fly ball to right field which went for a triple, and scored on an error on the relay to third base.

Genesee held that 1-0 lead until the 5th inning when 3 bashes on balls, a hit batter, and an unfortunate Genesee error produced 2 Tiger runs.

Genesee responded by putting runners on 1st and 3rd after a hit batter, a stolen base, and a walk. Genesee then tried a double steal. Tiger catcher Jesse Shafer faked a throw to second but fired the ball back to pitcher David Agee who relayed the ball to 3rd baseman Bryan Jones who tagged the 3rd base runner out. Agee then struck out the next Genesee batter to end the threat. In the top of the 7th inning Brandon Cleveland hit a line drive to center field but Ricky Haynes made a great catch for the 1st out. Agee struck out 4 of the next 6 batters to end the game. He finished the game with 12 strike outs while throwing only 68 pitches in 7 innings.

Massive Earth Slide Destroyed Home Near Juliaetta

The 14-by-60 foot mobile home belonging to Kellie and Bryon Umphenour of Juliaetta was reduced to rubble after the hillside above it slammed into it from the hillside above shortly before midnight last Wednesday, May 13, on McGary Grade.

By the time the slide came to rest, an estimated 30,000 to 40,000 cubic yards of material—enough to fill 3,000 dump trucks—covered McGary Grade and the area below it.

Both Kellie and Brian were in the trailer at the time the slide occurred. Neither remember much about the incident. Kellie was listed in good condition at St. Joseph Regional medical center. Bryon, 26, was in fair condition with a broken leg, a dislocated hip and an injured arm.

Early Thursday morning, Nez Perce County Road Supervisor Jerry Black was on the scene and later in the day said the slide appeared to be caused by water from natural springs.

McGary Grade, is a "farm-to-market road that often serves as a shortcut from the Palouse to U. S. Hwy. 12. It will be closed for an undetermined time. It is currently buried under 21 feet of debris.

It was a bitter loss for the Tigers who had beaten Greenleaf in a morning game to force the final afternoon match in the double elimination tournament. Kendrick had battled back out of the loser's bracket to gain the finals.

After pounding Greenleaf and its ace pitcher Doug Winters, 8-1, in the first championship game Saturday, the Tigers gave up eight runs in the bottom of the fifth inning in a 9-8 loss. Kendrick needed to beat the Grizzlies twice for the title, while Greenleaf needed just one victory.

Sophomore Jody Brown and senior, Tony Howerton both doubled in two-hit games to lead Kendrick in the second game.

Sophomore Luke Ogle doubled and singled in the first game while junior Richie Hitchcock had three hits and junior Bryan Carter had two.

Brown pitched a complete game five-hitter in the first game to improve his record to 12-1 on the season.

Kendrick finished the season with an 18-7 record. The young Tigers lose just three seniors—Howerton, Jimmy Chilberg and Josh Fletcher—and return five juniors, eight sophomores and six freshmen.

Commitment To Learning

Last time we explored Constructive Use of Time, this week we will look at the important issue, "Commitment to Learning."

There are many ways that a community can support learning. In Nampa, Idaho, where the Healthy Youth initiative is, "It's better to build a young person than to rehabilitate an adult," teachers are praising a highly personalized tutoring program for fourth, fifth and sixth-grade students in need of academic help. Kendrick High School's schedule for 1998-99 sets aside time for high school math students to travel to Juliaetta Elementary to tutor fourth, fifth and sixth grade math students. Proposed funding for this program is thanks to a grant written by Loren Gilson, Juliaetta Elementary principal.

Kendrick's Jr./Sr. High schedule also includes a mandatory tutored study hall for those seventh and eighth graders whose grade in any class falls below 70%. With this help, we hope to better prepare our students for high school.

Other elements that enhance a commitment to learning are: Achievement motivation—Young person is motivated to do well in school.

School engagement—Young person is actively engaged in learning.

Homework—Student reports doing at least one hour of homework each school day.

Bonding—student cares about his/her school.

Reading for pleasure—Young person sees adult family members reading for pleasure. And they read for pleasure two or more hours weekly.

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Communities Report Infrastructure Progress At Rural Partners Meeting May 11

Representing community and economic development activity in the five counties of Region II, attendance at the May 11 meeting of Rural Partners at Lewis-Clark State College was about evenly divided between service providers and community leaders. Nine providers were on hand to offer assistance to the six communities reporting on progress in various infrastructure

projects. Taken in the order in which they reported, Pierce led off with news of a successful town clean-up day, a subject that brought positive responses from the group, including the suggestion to put together a guide on how to organize and carry out such projects. Pierce is also getting in gear for the MIRA project (Managing Information with Rural America) and planning to focus on Pierce's history during its 1860 Days

celebration, July 31-August 2.

Kendrick-Juliaetta proudly announced that the community would be hosting the District II, Class A-4 state baseball championship series on the field at Juliaetta's Centennial Park, an initial Gem Community project. While promoting the annual Locust Blossom Festival, Kendrick-Juliaetta also announced that Kendrick's honey locust tree holds the state record and further that volunteers and members of the Urban Forestry Committee had planted 24 trees in Kendrick on Arbor Day and that Juliaetta was planning to hold a Blackberry Festival. The Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Assoc. has also added six more buildings to the community's historic walking tour and has an update of the brochure in the works. Plans are to advertise the tour in area convention facilities as a tourist attraction.

Having invited Bovill's mayor Becky Kellom to speak to their membership about Bovill's city-owned and operated recreational vehicle facility, K-JCDA is also starting to think again about the prospects of having such a facility in this community. Yes, Bovill has a fifteen-space RV facility that so far has generated 7 to 10 thousand dollars income for the city—and that's without having done any advertising! The city anticipates hiring a park host to manage the site. Some of the income has already gone toward the purchase of needed city maintenance equipment.

Supported by grant funds and local contributions, Bovill has purchased and converted a former church building into a community library and at latest counting has an additional \$15,000 on hand to make improvements, pending the updating of building codes in June. Using funds from its original Gem Community grant, Bovill has also finished its "walk in the park" project. It has also been making major repairs to the town's water delivery system.

And it isn't just the so-called hard infrastructure that captures Bovill's interest and enthusiasm and energy of its mayor. Its active School to Work program, for example, sees two students employed to maintain the school's computers and to teach fellow-students and adults how to use them. And as a Community of Promise, Bovill has through the Alliance for Growth project been actively involving youth in community service projects, greatly reducing juvenile delinquency and winning the plaudits of juvenile authorities. Lapwai's mayor, Barbara Green

was on hand to report that her city continues to work on its comprehensive plan, with one more revision underway. A recycling project began there in April and a clean-up day was scheduled for May 17. Like any other mayor, Green also has to deal with citizens' requests for infrastructure improvement, including sidewalks and recreational facilities such as a swimming pool. Community development providers on hand were quick to point out sources of assistance in such efforts. The topic of underwriting the costs of swimming pool operations drew considerable discussion during the session. New sources of funding—or fuller use of existing sources of funding—were also discussed. Consensus was that someone needs to do a study of how municipal and privately owned pools are financed and come up with suggested ways of being able economically to maintain and even expand such services.

Representatives of the Nez Perce Tribe reported on water projects in Lapwai and on developing plans to connect Hatwai Plaza with Lewiston's sewer line. Thought is being given to the possibility of opening a convenience store and RV facility in the vicinity of the Casino. Again and again reference was made to the need for more communication between the Tribe and incorporated communities such as Lapwai, Kamiah, and Kooskia. Tribal representatives spoke of the need to forge a partnership to serve the mutual interests of the Tribe and those cities. The Tribe also reported on its national involvement in planning what it prefers to call the Lewis-Clark Bi-centennial observance, or commemoration. They are as Nez Perce understandably reluctant to see anything to celebrate in the events associated with Lewis and Clark and what followed.

And finally, speaking for Weippe's Gem Community team, Nancy Webster praised Rural Partners for being a solution-based group of service providers and citizen leaders. Webster reported that a recent meeting of their Gem Community group revealed that nearly every project from their original Gem plan had been realized. In anticipation of the Lewis-Clark Bi-Centennial, Weippe is now focusing on meeting the demands of cultural tourism. A community youth center is also in the works there.

Three of the communities represented at the meeting are members of the Idaho cluster chosen to take part in the MIRA project, a Kellogg Foundation program designed to learn how to improve rural communication and thus problem solving through technology. Participants
