Paul Dammarell, 79, Passes May 26

Arthur (Paul) Dammarell, 79, a retired construction worker and a Kendrick resident, died Tuesday, May 26, at Tri-State Health and Rehabilitation Center at Clarkston from causes related to age.

He was born June 2, 1918, to Edgar H. and Nellie Middleton Dammarell at Kendrick.

He was raised in Kendrick and moved to Walla Walla, where he graduated from high school in 1936.

He married Mavella (Midge) Parsons October 18, 1941, at Nezperce.

He moved to Craigmont, where he helped build grain elevators, then to Orofino, where he drove a truck for an oil company.

He moved to Herminston, Ore., where he worked for the US Army Corps of Engineers.

In 1943 he moved back to Craigmont and worked in farming. He later bought the Standard Oil Bulk Plant, which he owned until he summer of 1951.

He and his brother then ventured into road paving and he moved to the Moscow-Pullman area.

In 1957 he moved to Troy, Idaho, where he worked in contracting and heavy construction. In 1971 because of failing health he quit working in construction and started work at the University of Idaho. He worked there until his retirement in 1980.

In 1985 he moved to the Juliaetta-Kendrick area.

He was a member of the Juliaetta Community Church, a former member of the Lions Club and a member of the Teamsters Union.

He enjoyed hunting, fishing and gold mining and the outdoors. He enjoyed his family and visiting with friends.

He is survived by his wife at the family home in Kendrick; a daughter, Norma Kay Dammarell of Boise; two sons, Buz of Spokane, Charlie of Kendrick, and a grandson Chris of Grandview, Wash.; two brothers, Robert of Boise and Roger G. of Santa Rosa, Ca.; seven grandchildren; and 15 great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by a granddaughter; two sisters, Ruth Asplund and Edith Wirt; and five brothers, F. K., John, Edgar, Howard, and Keith Dammarell.

There was a memorial service on Friday at the Juliaetta Community Church. Cremation has taken place.

The family suggests memorials may be sent to the Juliaetta Community Church or the J-K Ambulance Service.

Little Concerns—

A few days ago I experienced a medical emergency on the streets of Kendrick. My immediate concern was for myself and family. I was whisked away to Lewiston via ambulance and then by helicopter to Spokane for heart valve surgery. My wife and daughters gathered at the hospital and were naturally concerned with my surgery and recovery. Not once did we concern ourselves with my pickup left on main street with the keys still in it. Nor were we concerned that our unlocked house would not be secured. We did not give a thought to the facts that the house was not cleaned, yard not mowed, garbage not taken out. I did not call the paper and tell them I would be gone for over a week, and I failed to tell the post office to hold my mail.

I have lived in Kendrick most of my life and know it to be the greatest place in live and raise children, but sometimes I forget just how wonderful this small town really is.

And now I am only concerned about my recovery and how to pay back all of the friends and neighbors who stepped in and took care of our concerns during our crisis.

Thank you seems so small but it is heartfelt.

Parker McCreary to Lead U. of I. Alumni Assoc.

The 100th anniversary year of the University of Idaho Alumni Association will be led by former Kendrick resident, F. Parker McCreary. McCreary was elected to the presidency of the Association at its annual meeting held May 16 on the Idaho campus.

A member of the U of I class of 1956, McCreary has been a member of the Association Board of Directors since 1995. He succeeds Larry Strohmeier of Danville, California, and will hold the leadership position for one year. He is joined by Ms. Elaine Ambrose, Boise, as Vice President and John LoBuono, Idaho Falls as Treasurer.

The Association, a 75,000 member organization of graduates and former students of the university, will be meeting at Homecoming this October 3rd for a major celebration of the 100 years of the corporation's existence.

McCreary graduated from Kendrick High School in 1952 and began attending the university that fall. He returned to the U of I to serve on the administration from 1964 to 1975 where he served as Assistant to the President, Director of Development and University Relations and active Director of the University of Idaho Foundation.

Parker and the McCreary family have deep roots to the Kendrick Gazette. His grandfather, P. C. McCreary and his father, Wm. L. McCreary published the Gazette from 1930 to 1968 when Wm. L. sold to the present owner.

Other speakers will include Orofino author Tom Farbo, Ed Lozard, and Everett Martin, Chairman of Weippe's Lewis and Clark Bicentennial Committee. Space will be provided for the display of history projects. An update on the Regional History newsletter is also expected. Hours are from registration and set-up at 9:00 until 3:00.
