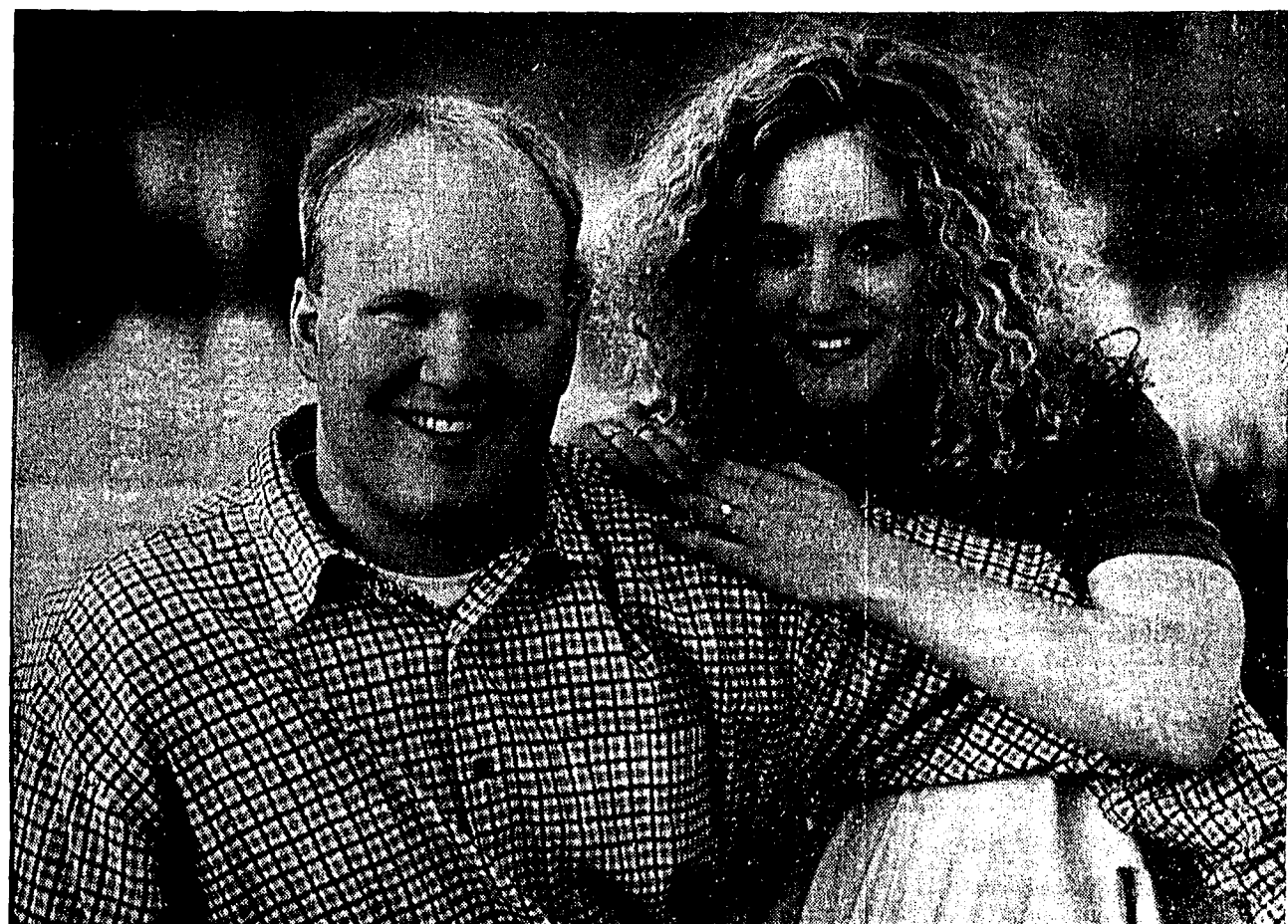

## Ernest Andrews, Retired Farmer, Dies June 5

A memorial service for Ernest Andrews, a retired American Ridge farmer, was held Wednesday, June 5 at Malcoms Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston. The Rev. Dean Stewart of Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Moscow officiated.

Andrews died Friday, June 5, of causes related to age at the Latah Health Services Nursing Home at Moscow. He was 85.

He was born May 9, 1913, to William E. and Daisy A. Winogard Andrews at Hermes, Colorado. He grew up in the Burlington, Colo. area and attended school there.

In 1936 he moved to Lewiston and worked for the Civilian Conservation Corps for one year. He married Rena F. Hill July 1, 1937.

He continued to work in the Lewiston area as a carpenter until 1953, when he moved his family to Kendrick to farm and ranch on American Ridge. He retired in 1983 and moved to Moscow.

His wife died April 14, 1994.

He enjoyed fishing, hunting, camping and spending time with family and friends. He was a member of the Elks, Eagles and Moose lodges, Palouse Clearwater Search and Rescue, Moscow Eagles Camper Club and Emmanuel Lutheran Church of Moscow.

He is survived by two daughters, Norma Crocker of Spalding and Evelyn Russell of Kent, Wash.; a son Wesley L. Andrews of Moscow; a sister, Valda Andrews of Lewiston; a brother, Bud Andrews of Eugene, Ore.; eight grandchildren; and seven great-grandchildren.

A son, Monte C. Andrews, and five brothers died previously.

She worked for the U. S. Postal Service, and was employed as a letter carrier and clerk. She was a member of the Postal Workers Union. She retired in January of this year.

She was a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and attended the Troy Branch.

To continue her service to others, Dian willed her body to science.

A memorial luncheon was conducted at the Troy LDS Branch building in Troy, Saturday, June 6.

## Phase 2 of Kendrick's Water/Sewer Replacement Project Begins Next Week

The second phase of the City of Kendrick's water and sewer improvement project is scheduled to begin Monday, June 15, Mayor Jerry L. Brown said Tuesday morning.

The work is a continuation of a project begun two years ago to bring these portions of the city's infrastructure up to current standards. The construction will include a new 8-inch water main from 9th Street and Main St. out to the Kendrick High School and a new 10-inch sanitary sewer main from 9th and Main St. (between Watts and the old Long house), to "B" Street and a storm sewer main from 9th and Main Street to Reservoir Road.

This means construction will be taking place up 9th Street (old school house hill, down the other side to the high school)—so be prepared to experience some inconvenience during construction, Mayor Brown said. Riverview Construction of Orofino is the contractor for this part of the project.

Another part of Phase 2 already underway is the welcome addition of a new well to the city water system. The well was drilled last February and the city recently awarded the contract to install the pump, build a well house, and install the electrical system to Strom Electric of Troy.

The well should be on line by the end of June and help alleviate the water shortages the city has experienced in the past. The new well will produce about 100 gallons per minute.

Brown says the city will keep residents informed of the progress of the projects through the Gazette.

In Woods, Says Sheriff**

As the camping season is coming upon us, the Latah County Sheriff's Office wants to remind visitors to the woods that drinking and driving a four-wheeler or motorcycle on roads open to public use is not only dangerous but illegal. The Latah County Sheriff's Office in conjunction with the U. S. Forest Service and the Idaho State Patrol will be periodically conducting Driving Under the Influence (DUI) emphasis patrols in the forested and camping areas throughout Latah County.

The Latah County Sheriff's Office is advising all forest patrons that while in the woods on roads open to the public, four-wheeler and motorcycle operators are subject to the same laws as if they were on a paved highway. These laws will be enforced to help ensure the safety and enjoyment of all who recreate in the woods of Latah County.
