Lloyd Kimbley, 76, Passes June 30

A graveside service will be held Friday at 10:30 a. m. for Lloyd E. Kimbley at the Southwick Cemetery. Post 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars will provide military honors.

Kimbley, a lifelong resident of the Southwick-Kendrick area, died Tuesday, June 30 of congestive heart failure at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center in Lewiston. He was 76.

He was born Feb. 1, 1922, to Isaac T. and Anna M. Dorendorf Kimbley at Crescent, near Southwick. He attended school at Crescent.

He served with the U. S. Army during World War II from November 1941 through November 1945.

He married Pearl M. Harter Feb. 21, 1948, at Lewiston. He worked in logging and construction.

He enjoyed gardening, woodworking, watching wildlife and playing the fiddle.

Survivors include his wife at the family home in Kendrick; five sons, Burton G. Kimbley of Lewiston, David E. Kimbley of Portland, Ore., Thomas D. Kimbley of Juliaetta, Alan D. Kimbley of Lady Lake, Fla., and Eugene L. Kimbley of Kendrick; a daughter Linda J. Moss of Lewiston; two sisters, Margaret Craig of Moscow and Edna Magee of Lewiston; a brother, Robert Kimbley of Southwick; 11 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by a sister, Irene Hudson.

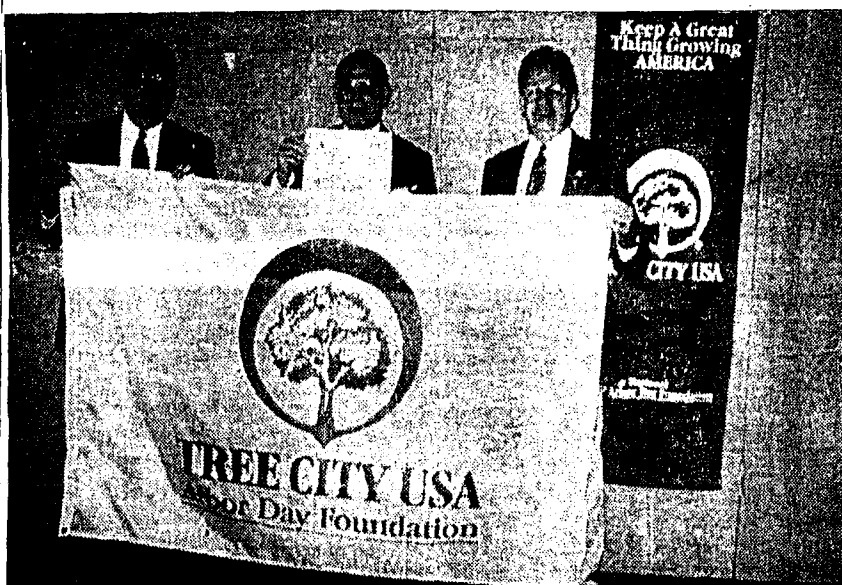

Kendrick Recognized as Tree City USA



Kendrick was recently recognized as a Tree City USA during a special luncheon at the Association of Idaho Cities conference in Idaho Falls June 19. Kendrick's outstanding community forestry program is an important asset to the city and the quality of life for Kendrick's residents. Kendrick mayor Jerry Brown accepted the award for the city.

Nineteen Idaho communities have been given Tree City USA status by the National Arbor Day Foundation. That is an increase of 9 cities in one year. Stan Hamilton, Director of the Idaho Department of Lands said, "Doubling our Tree Cities USA in one year is good but our goal is to have the majority of Idaho's communities on the list. AIC's conference is a natural forum to encourage more towns to seek Tree City USA designation."

The requirements for TCUSA designation are: (1) have a tree committee; (2) have a tree ordinance, (3) spend at least \$2 per capita on tree programs and (4) proclaim and celebrate Arbor Day. Idaho's 19 cities contain 55% of the state's urban population. Together, they spent more than \$2.3 million on tree

grams in 1997. Following the recognition luncheon, Chuck Geska, President of the Association of Idaho Cities, said, "The focus of the AIC is to better the quality of Idaho's cities. Nothing beautifies a city more than well-cared for trees, so our partnership with IDL and the Idaho Community Forestry Council is in step with our goals. The Tree City USA awards are a perfect opportunity to recognize the cities for their efforts to enhance the environment of their communities."

Other cities receiving the award were: Boise, Buhl, Caldwell, Coeur d'Alene, Downey, Eagle, Heyburn, Idaho Falls, Kuna, Lapwai, Lewiston, Mackay, Moscow, Mountain Home AFB, Pocatello, Post Falls, Samaria and Sandpoint.

Oat Cereal Recalled for Possible Salmonella

Idaho consumers are being warned that a common breakfast cereal linked to a national Salmonella outbreak has been found in Idaho. The product, a plain toasted oat cereal, is sold under these brand names: IGA, Flavorite, Janet Lee, Malt-O-Meal, Safeway, Smith's, and Western Family. The cereals are sold throughout Idaho.

"Anyone who has purchased plain toasted oat cereal labeled with any of these brands is urged not to eat it and to return these products to the store of purchase," said Dr. Christine Hahn, Idaho State Epidemiologist. Symptoms of Salmonella infection include high fever, severe headache, vomiting, nausea, abdominal pain, and diarrhea. Anyone exhibiting these symptoms should see their doctor.

One confirmed case of Salmonella infection has been linked to the product in Idaho. The affected person, an eight-month-old Boise area child, has recovered from the infection.
