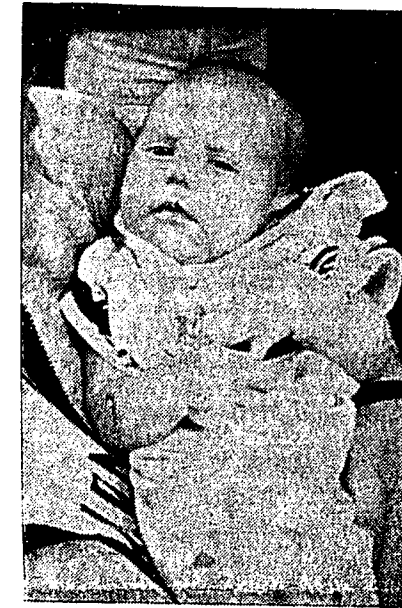

# Kendrick Gazette Purchased By New County-Wide Paper

The Kendrick Gazette, Idaho's last hot metal newspaper, was sold this week to the LatahEagle, a newly established county-wide publication. The merger becomes effective next week. This is the final edition of The Gazette, said Bill Roth, editor and publisher of the paper since 1968. Ill health was the primary reason for Roth's decision to sell the Gazette. Roth will continue to retain the building and equipment and will still accept commercial printing work.

Subscribers to The Gazette will continue to receive a weekly newspaper. All subscriptions will be honored a full value until they expire. Recognizing the sudden price increase (the new publisher is offering a special renewal offer (see separate article). The new publisher, L. J. Nisse, is an experienced newspaper editor, and for the past 16 years has owned and operated the Boomerang from her hometown in Palouse. The main office will now be in Potlatch. With the exception of earlier deadlines for news and advertising, local subscribers will find little change in submitting material for their newspaper. All material from this area can still be submitted at the Gazette office in Kendrick where Roth will be working. It is the goal of the new owner to provide the community with same locally oriented service that this area has come to expect from their newspaper.

The decision to sell the Gazette and turn its operation over to someone else wasn't an easy one to make. Health problems gave me no options and really no choice; but it still wasn't easy. I had to go.

I have been given more support, friendship cooperation than any newspaperman might expect. In addition to supporting the Gazette you, the readers, have been forgiving of my mistakes, tolerant of my shortcomings, and understanding of my problems. I shall always remember your kindness.

For my staff who have worked with me for many years, I have love, respect and gratitude. To Paula, Marlene, Rose Ann, John and Frank and all the correspondents I say "without you I could not have done it." You've been precious beyond words.

And, finally, to the business community, your support and advertising provided the basis for the Gazette to be printed each week and I acknowledge my indebtedness to you.

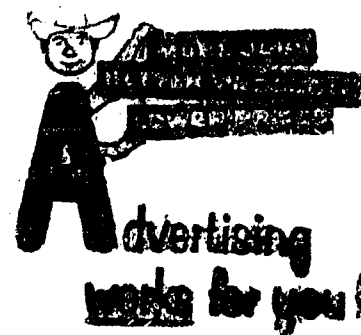
